BILL SUMMARY

- Modifies the penalties for resisting arrest, depending on the circumstances.
 - Classifies resisting arrest as an "offense of violence."

CONTENT AND OPERATION

Resisting arrest

Penalties

A person who, recklessly or by force, resists or interferes with the lawful arrest of the person or another is guilty of resisting arrest. Under current law, resisting arrest is generally a second degree misdemeanor. The bill raises the base level penalty to a first degree misdemeanor. If the offense results in physical harm to a law enforcement officer, the penalty increases from a first degree misdemeanor to a fifth degree felony. If the offender caused physical harm to a law enforcement officer by means of a deadly weapon, the bill reduces the penalty for the offense from a fourth degree felony to a fifth degree felony. However, if the offender brandishes a deadly weapon while resisting arrest, the offense remains a fourth degree felony.¹

Classification as "offense of violence"

The bill adds "resisting arrest" to the list of offenses within the definition of "offense of violence."² The term "offense of violence" is used throughout the Revised

Code in a variety of ways. The uses include the criminalization of conduct involving threats to commit, or the commission of, an offense of violence,³ an increase in the penalty for certain offenses if an offender previously has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to an offense of violence,⁴ and license issuance, employment, and other restrictions imposed upon persons convicted of an offense of violence.⁵
