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WHEREAS, Ohio's existing coal power plant fleet is a vital 15 economic resource representing billions of dollars in public and 16 private investments over the past century, including substantial 17 recent investments to upgrade the coal fleet and install 18 expensive pollution controls as required by previous rules 19 adopted by the USEPA. The existing coal power plant fleet 20 ensures the availability of reliable, abundant, and low-cost 21 electricity critical to Ohio's economy and especially the 22 continued revival of the manufacturing industry in Ohio; and 23

WHEREAS, In light of the central importance of reliable, abundant, and low-cost electricity for Ohio's economy, Ohio's energy policy pursues a balanced "all fuels" approach that relies on coal, natural gas, and hydroelectric fuels, including energy efficient sources such as renewable energies. The USEPA's Clean Power Plan irreconcilably conflicts with Ohio's energy policy as determined and enacted by the Ohio General Assembly and usurps the authority of the General Assembly to establish Ohio's energy policy going forward; and

WHEREAS, The USEPA lacks the legal authority to establish33Ohio's energy policy under federal law and the United States34Constitution, including the Tenth Amendment, which reserves35powers to the states; now therefore be it36

RESOLVED, That we, the members of the 131st General Assembly of the State of Ohio, oppose the United States Environmental Protection Agency's Clean Power Plan; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit duly authenticated copies of this resolution to the President of the United States, the Administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency, the Speaker and Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, the President Pro Tempore and Secretary of the United States Senate, each member
