# Testimony for Single-payer Healthcare-

Chairman Brinkman, Vice-chair Henne and Members of the Ohio House insurance committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on House Bill 440,

My name is Mark Dent, I honorably served our county in the U.S. Army as a JAG Attorney. As an attorney, I compared the case I was working on to other similar cases to determine how best to proceed. That is how I look at our healthcare.

When I look at similar rich industrialized nations and their healthcare systems, I can only conclude that we have failed.

We pay twice as much as other industrialized nation for our healthcare and what do we get?

We pay twice as much and have lower life expectancy, [figures released this month shows that it is getting worse, not better.]

We pay twice as much and cover fewer people.

We pay twice as much to see our doctors less often and have less preventative care.

We pay twice as much and have higher infant mortality. In fact, our infant mortality rate as a nation is in line with Cuba, we can't even keep our children alive.

We are told we have a capitalist system with markets that give us the best solutions but do we?

We give monopolies to drug companies and insist our citizens pay 7 times as much for the medicine that keeps them alive. Why? They need the money for research, yet Ford and GM spend more on research then drug companies do.

That is not capitalism, it is exploitation and extortion. Number one cause for bankruptcy-Medical bills.

You don't have to tell me our healthcare is broken, just ask anyone who has used it, they will tell you.

But it's complicated you say. Well, England has done a better job at figuring it out, Germany has, France has. Spain is on its way to have the highest life expectancy of any country on earth and Japan is currently ranked number one. What do they have in common? they pay 1/2 as much as we do and they regulate their healthcare industry.

Is there a better system out there that uses a market-based approach, maybe, but you have not come up with that yet. We know what works cause we've seen it in other countries and while no system is perfect, they all get better results than ours.

That said, I was on so-called 'socialized medicine' in the U.S. Military. When I needed healthcare, I would walk into any of the military hospitals, show my ID and I was taken care of. No forms to fill out. No co-pays. No insurance companies to fight with. I got expert care and never had to worry. What does this type of system cost? Surprisingly if our country moved to this system it would cost half of what we pay now and cover everyone. We would live longer, see our doctors more often and have better results.

I ask that you pass this bill and if not, come up with a system that provides better care to all our citizens at half the price.

If you can't do that you need to step aside and let those who can take your place.

Don't tell me it's too complicated, Germany, England, France, Canada, the list goes on they pay half the price for better care. They figured it out. We're the greatest nation on earth, can't we figure this out?

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


The United States has the lowest life expectancy of any rich industrialized nation, Ohio is even lower than the U.S. average



# Healthcare Costs-


How much are we paying for substandard care?


