



Testimony on H.B. 49: Main Operating Budget for FY 2018-2019
Senate Finance: General Government and Agency Review Subcommittee

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Chair Jordan, Vice Chair O'Brien and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on House Bill 49. As Ohio's statewide coalition, the Ohio Alliance to End Sexual Violence advocates for comprehensive responses and rape crisis services for survivors and empowers communities to prevent sexual violence.

I'm here today to ask for your continued support for Ohio's rape crisis centers. Many victims of sexual violence in Ohio still reside in counties without a rape crisis center, and must travel long distances to get to the nearest center or even the closest hospital with a trained Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner. For many victims, this means they never make that journey and suffer in silence, dealing with the pain on their own; sometimes self-medicating; sometimes repeatedly missing work or dropping out of school entirely; sometimes having multiple visits to healthcare facilities over their lifespan to deal with chronic health issues, all brought on by the victimization of rape.

Ohio has made incredible strides in its support of victims of sexual assault within the past four years. For the first time ever, the state established dedicated funding through the Rape Crisis Centers Fund (RCCF) at \$1 million per fiscal year in the 130th General Assembly. House Bill 64 built on this foundation of support by increasing the RCCF to \$1.5 million per fiscal year.

Understanding this is a very tight budget cycle, we ask for your support of the \$1.5 million currently included for the RCCF each fiscal year in HB 49 and ask that should additional revenue be available, the legislature consider growing the fund.

Approximately 743,000 adult women living in Ohio are survivors of rape,¹ and one in four girls and one in six boys being sexually abused before they turn 18 years old². Progress has been made to expand availability of vital services for victims in recent years:

- Only **42** counties received RCCF funded services in FY '14
- **51** counties received RCCF funded services in '15
- Today, **28** rape crisis centers provide life saving services to **77** counties with the support of the RCCF.

While gaps remain in 11 counties without comprehensive rape crisis services, this funding has resulted in more than 14,000 Ohioans receiving critical services that they would not have otherwise.

Our plan for Ohio is to continue expanding the availability of rape crisis services in counties without such services, while sustaining and growing existing services.

We are extremely grateful for the legislative support that rape crisis centers have received in recent years. Given the continued need for these services, we are hopeful that you can build on the support that you have already provided. The bill, in its current form, dedicates \$1.5 million each fiscal year for rape crisis centers. **We ask for your support to protect, and if possible, grow the fund.** Any increased funding would help ensure that we can continue to expand the number of victims who have access to desperately needed services. An increase in funding would also allow us to substantially increase prevention efforts statewide.

We have much work ahead of us to ensure that no matter where a person lives in Ohio, there is access to comprehensive rape crisis services. While federal grants fluctuate from year to year, with countless restrictions on federal funding on essential costs that non-profits need just to keep their doors open; and grants like VOCA not funding prevention and requiring a 20-25% match just to receive the other 75-80% of funds, it's no small feat that Ohio's rape crisis centers have remained open over the years.

We are incredibly thankful for the Rape Crisis Fund. It has literally kept the doors open of some of Ohio's rape crisis centers and provided such critical funding to programs to support survivors in their communities and to increase prevention to stop rape from happening in the first place.
