

SEO Library Consortium Year In Review

The SEO Symphony ILS Service successfully migrated to the SirsiDynix Cloud-based service, SaaS on April 12. The availability of these Cloud services will allow SEO to deliver all of the library services more efficiently with optimal performance.

The SEO Director's Forum was held May, 12 at the State Library in Columbus. New services were identified in the meeting including On-Demand Technology Training which replaced the Mobile Technology Training Center lab. The mobile training center was in use for 14 years. The new program offers a one day training at your location as opposed to dropping off the mobile lab and your staff responsible for the training.

The SEO IT Services began supporting the Who's On My WiFi project which allows libraries to monitor and count the number of devices on their wireless network. This tool will enable libraries to complete the State Annual Report.

How to Schedule

The Ohio Digital Library is a consortium of 177 Ohio public libraries. The libraries share a collection of digital media that includes eBooks, audiobooks, magazines (periodicals) and video. Started in 2005 as the Ohio eBook Project, it is funded in part by LSTA funds awarded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services to the State Library of Ohio.

This statewide project helps public libraries provide these services at a considerable savings. The State Library of Ohio acts as Project Manager and contracts with OverDrive®, Inc. to make this project a reality. The holdings include over 76,500 copies of eBooks and audiobooks and more than 48,000 individual titles. To view the collection visit: OhioeBooks.com


Enrollment

Enrollment in the Ohio Digital Library consortium is open to public libraries in Ohio serving populations of 100,000 and under.

Cost to Participate

The cost of the Ohio Digital Library is 4.5 - 5 percent of a library's annual collection budget in the purchase of materials for the shared collection. The library does not send the enrollment fee to the State Library or OverDrive. Instead, once a library is enrolled and launched, they can then purchase materials to add to the collection. The State Library will track each library's spending to ensure they are meeting their minimum requirement.





LSTA IN OHIO 2013-2017

Background

The Grants to States Program is the largest grant program run by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS); it provides funds to State Library Administrative Agencies (SLAAs) in the form of Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds using a population-based formula set by the law. SLAAs determine goals and objectives for the funds in their statutorily required five-year plan. For more information, see the <u>Grants to States program overview</u>.

LSTA Five-Year Plan 2013-2017 goals:

Goal 1: Learning: Engaging and empowering learning experiences: The State Library of Ohio supports programs and experiences that assist libraries in preparing individuals to be active learners and full participants in the local communities and the global society.

Goal 2: Community: Community anchor institutions: The State Library of Ohio promotes libraries as strong community anchors that enhance civic engagement, cultural opportunities and economic vitality.

Goal 3: Content: Discovery of knowledge and cultural heritage. The State Library of Ohio supports exemplary stewardship of library collections and promotes the use of technology to facilitate discovery of knowledge and cultural heritage.

Goal 4: Access: Sustain access to knowledge. The State Library of Ohio works to sustain and increase access to information and ideas.

IMLS Focal Points – Ohio Highlights:

Literacy

 Coordinate summer reading program resources for public libraries across Ohio, including maintaining active membership in the national Collaborative Summer Library Program, and distributing related materials and other resources to participating libraries. Produce and distribute an evaluation tool annually for public libraries to use for reporting summer reading program results.

- Support public libraries' role as providers of early literacy experiences and education in their communities through resources, trainings, and other tools offered by the Ohio Ready-to-Read initiative.
- Continue to grow the Choose to Read Ohio initiative to encourage reading and sharing of books and to promote appreciation of Ohio authors and literature, in partnership with Ohioana Library Association and Ohio Center for the Book.
- Develop partnerships with stakeholders in the early childhood community to facilitate projects and affirm the role of public libraries in early literacy education.

Access to E-Resources

- Provide access to the selected e-database content to all Ohioans via a combination of funding and methods developed with other Libraries Connect Ohio partners (OPLIN, OhioLINK, INFOhio).
- Provide library users access to e-content through the Ohio Digital Library Consortium.

Interlibrary Loans

- The <u>Serving Every Ohioan</u> (SEO) Center will continue to identify and obtain print and electronic resources for libraries whose own collections are inadequate for user needs.
- The SEO Automation Consortium will continue as a primary means through which public libraries access a shared integrated library system (ILS) for resource sharing.
- Facilitate and promote statewide resource sharing.

Digitization/Preservation

- Promote distribution and access of information through digitization and reformatting of materials, and develop and implement a strategy to expand public access to the information, meaning, and content found in the library collections.
- Support the development of the Digitization Hub initiative, whereby the Hubs are actively working to digitize their own collections as well as collections of other cultural heritage institutions in their geographical area.
- Serve as the administering and coordinating organization for the Ohio Digital Network, the Ohio Digital Public Library of America service hub.

Job Seekers

- Partner with other agencies to leverage the resources of libraries in advancing national priorities, including education, digital literacy and economic and workforce development.
- Coordinate the Guiding Ohio Online program, to deliver digital literacy training at rural Ohio libraries.

Business Resources

• Encourage libraries to enhance economic capacity in the community through project and program partnerships. A key example is meeting the information needs of small businesses.

Continuing Education

- Facilitate partnerships among libraries of all types and other education providers to improve the capacity of librarians and library leaders to offer learning opportunities and training to their customers.
- Offer trainings for library staff via webinars, self-paced tutorials, pathfinders, in-person training sessions, and archived webinars on a variety of topics as requested by the Ohio library community.
- Continue support of the Library Leadership Ohio initiative and ILEAD USA.

Programs

- Invest in projects that strengthen the role of libraries as core components of the broader community learning and services infrastructure.
- Encourage libraries to host forums that draw people together to discuss topics of local community interest.

Special Services for Special Needs

• Continue to support the Blind and Physically Disabled Program.

What would happen if LSTA funds went away:

- EBSCO databases would disappear (or would have to be funded at the local level). The lack of LSTA funding to support the Ohio Web Library (OWL) would jeopardize the partnership and could potentially lead to elimination of the OWL.
- Ohio Library for the Blind and Physically Disabled services would be curtailed.
- Public Libraries would not receive summer reading materials and summer reading workshops would no longer be subsidized.
- Ohio Digital Library support from the State Library would no longer be available; member libraries would be required to pay a portion of the yearly software maintenance (\$125,000)
- Data available through the Public Library Survey would be minimal.
- Consulting services, such as strategic planning, space design, youth services would be significantly reduced or eliminated.
- WebJunction and Skillsoft courses would no longer be available to library staff.
- Competitive grants would no longer exist.
- The SEO Library Center would no longer be partially supported with federal funding, requiring the elimination of some services such as Technology Training on Demand.
- Leadership programs such as Library Leadership Ohio and ILEAD-Ohio would be eliminated.
- The process of establishing the Ohio Digital Network as a service hub for DPLA would be significantly delayed or ended.

...created STEAM e-kits for children, tweens and teens, containing emerging tech to encourage STEAM learning and lesson plans and programming for library staff or teachers to create a quick and organized program right out of the box. - Northeast Ohio Regional Library System





...provided data-visualization training to Ohio library staff using Tableau, an analytics and data-visualization software, designed to prepare Ohio library personnel to incorporate visual data into their everyday practice. Over 350 library staff participated in the online training sessions. - Ohio State University Libraries

Library Leadership Ohio and ILEAD USA—Ohio included sessions from field experts, library innovators, technology gurus, team dynamics, grant writing, outreach and marketing. Talking Book Services

Library service for the blind and physically disabled in the United States is delivered through network a οf libraries and a g e n c i e s coordinated by the Library of Congress National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (NLS).

The Talking Book Program provides free recorded books, magazines and playback

equipment to over 14,000 eligible blind, visually impaired, physically handicapped, and reading disabled Ohio residents. There are over 3000 veterans participating in the Talking Book program.

The State Library of Ohio Talking Book Program coordinates the Ohio program and serves as the machine lending agency for the state. To help in this effort, the State Library collaborates with 60 sub lending agencies, local public libraries or social service organizations throughout Ohio to loan the machines to eligible citizens in their areas.

The Ohio Library for the Blind and Physically Disabled located at the Cleveland Public Library supplies the books and magazines.

ALL THE INFORMATION YOU NEED TO SUCCEED

Resources for All: The Ohio Web Library is a core collection of 73 online databases available to all Ohio residents. A library database is an electronic catalog or index to information resources and publications such as abstracts and articles from magazines, journals, and newspapers. Databases may also include books, encyclopedias, practice tests and tutorials, and audio, video, image collections and more.

The Ohio Web Library is provided by Libraries Connect Ohio (LCO), which is composed of four major Ohio library networks — OPLIN, OhioLINK, INFOhio, and the State Library of Ohio. LCO can cooperatively purchase access to these statewide resources at a cost-effective rate whereas most individual libraries would not be able to afford them on their own.

The Ohio Web Library is funded by a federal IMLS Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant through the State Library of Ohio, which provides about \$1.6 million per year. The three LCO library networks — OPLIN, OhioLINK, and INFOhio — provide an additional \$2.6 million in state funds each year from their budgets.
