Re: Support of SB 56 (Lehner and Tavares) – Step Therapy Protocols.

Dear Chairman Burke:

On behalf of the Ohio Association of Rheumatology (OAR), I am writing to raise an important issue with you that impact's a patient's ability to access appropriate treatment options.

Step therapy, also known as "fail-first," is a mechanism insurers use that requires patients to use one or more drugs chosen by the insurer before coverage is granted for the treatment prescribed by a physician.

Step therapy was created to limit how much insurers spend covering patients' medications, but it has evolved into a one-size-fits-all policy. For many physicians and patients it has become a significant barrier to getting the right care at the right time.

SB 56 does not prohibit insurers from using step therapy but seeks to balance cost containment with patient needs. SB 56 protects patients by:

- (1) Ensuring that step therapy decisions are based on clinical practice guidelines or medical or scientific evidence.
- (2) Requiring insurers to have a clear, convenient process for physicians to pursue a step therapy exemption.
- (3) Specifying the conditions under which it is medically appropriate to exempt patients from step therapy.

Excluding physicians' clinical judgment from patients' treatment plans creates a barrier to getting the right care at the right time. Step therapy can undermine a physicians' ability to effectively treat patients and lower quality of care, resulting in set-backs and disease progression for patients.

For these reasons, the Ohio Association of Rheumatology requests that you favorably vote in support of SB 56. Thank you for your consideration.
