Hello and good afternoon. My name is Anagha Velamakanni, and I am a 4th year undergraduate student at The Ohio State University. I'm here today to convey to you all my opposition towards HB 327 and HB 322. I choose to direct most of my attention in this testimony to HB 327, although I strongly believe both these bills should be opposed. House Bill 327 is pending legislation that prohibits the teaching, instructing, promoting, and advocating of "Divisive Concepts" in Pre-K-12, higher education, and political subdivisions. If this bill were to pass and be enacted, key parts of education within our system would be eradicated. This is counterproductive, as it is well known that the American education system, especially within some states, is not top-tier. Violators of this bill would have to endure penalties such as suspension, revocation of license, withholding of up to 100% of state funding, and even a denial of tenure and employment.
