OASL's Mission

The Ohio Association of Student Leaders is a non-profit organization dedicated to helping Ohio's middle and high school students identify and develop their leadership capacity to make positive change in their schools and communities. Our year-round leadership development programs focus on topics such as group dynamics, diversity and inclusion, self-esteem, authenticity, visioning and goal setting, organizational skills, collaboration, and community-building. Using experiential and active learning methods throughout our summer camps, weekend retreats, conferences, workshops, and peer-to-peer education opportunities, OASL programs boost student knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary to lead with purpose. OASL students cultivate positive relationships and connections with diverse others, feel and show empathy, and make responsible decisions for themselves and their communities. Created by students, teachers, and administrators back in 1953, we continue to design and facilitate our high-impact educational experiences specifically for the developmental needs of youth leaders in partnership with educators and schools across the state.

Why does OASL Need Funding?

OASL believes that all students have leadership potential, and at the same time recognizes that access to developing that potential is limited for many. We want to make sure that any student interested in growing in their leadership practice and learning how to collaborate with others to make lasting change has the opportunity to do so. We believe that as an organization formed, grown, and led by Ohio's educators, with leadership development curricula designed specifically for youth leaders, we are well-equipped to meet the leadership development needs of Ohio's diverse student population. We are committed to expanding and diversifying access to our programs.

We believe that until there is equity in opportunity and representation, all students miss out. Though we strive for affordability, the costs associated with attending our events can create a limiting factor and accessibility issue for some schools and students. Further, there is a lack of funding provided to administrators, teachers, students, and student activity advisors for leadership development opportunities. OASL will work to connect with school administrators, counselors, and teachers in all Ohio schools to create and sustain awareness of our programs and demonstrate how they positively impact students, schools, and communities. All student leaders in Ohio deserve awareness of and access to the opportunities provided by OASL.

What Financial Support Does OASL Seek?

The Ohio Association of Student Leaders is seeking funding to provide equitable opportunities for students and school districts across Central Ohio. The funding will be invested in two main ways; reducing student participant costs and investing in outreach, school resources/curriculum and data.

The funds will be used to cover scholarships for students and ultimately to reduce the registration costs and provide greater program access to students. For every program we run, costs include items such as facilities, program materials, curriculum design, administrative fees, staff training, meals, technology, and other equipment. For overnight programs, we are also incurring housing costs, conference and event fees, etc. If we have organizational funding to cover these operational costs, we rely less on registration fees and can therefore reduce costs to individual students. As needed, funds will also be used to provide direct student scholarships. This could include OASL contribution of scholarship money to help a school cover the cost to send their students. It could also include full sponsorship of students in need who do not have any additional support from their family, school, or community. Additionally funds will be used to invest further outreach and engagement initiatives. Lastly as we grow further we would like to move one of our part time employees to full time to trael to schools to provide resources, retreats, workshops to our schools to grow the overall program. Same time use data to make clear deciions on program impact and how we continue to grow.

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OASL Business Model

OF STUDENT LEADERS

OASL offers year-round leadership development programming that consists of week long summer workshops, weekend retreats, and single day events. OASL also provides resources, training, development opportunities, and leadership experiences for both students and educators.

The registration fees associated with our programming cover organizational costs that include programming, supplies, facilities, volunteer staff training, and insurance. The work of the organization is primarily conducted on a volunteer basis, with our four leadership team members receiving stipends for their administrative work on top of their volunteer commitment. The positions receiving stipends include our Executive Director, Director of Senior High Programs, Director of Middle Level Programs, and Director of Advancement. Outside of these four positions, our staff team includes high school students, college students, and adult educators who volunteer their time and talents in order to reduce overhead costs.

OASL's revenue is generated through annual school membership fees, participant registration fees, and individual donations. Additional funds obtained from events help keep the costs of future events at a minimum for students and their families. In recent years, we have been fortunate to receive a few moderate corporate grants and have hosted annual benefit events. Please refer to our submitted budget for more specific and detailed revenue and expenditures.

The funding we receive from State Funds and other sources would allow us to further reduce program registration costs to create more equitable opportunities for students and their families while at the same time ensure financial stability of our organization.

What makes OASL Unique?

As a youth leadership development organization, OASL stands out with our expertise, design, and impact. OASL offers a long-term, developmentally sequenced leadership development curriculum over the course of a student's entire middle school and high school experience, in some cases expanding into their post-high school/college years. Each of our programs (summer camps, retreats, workshops, conferences, etc.) features multiple levels of programming with rotating topics and activities that grow with students as they grow in their knowledge and skills. Upon completion of certain programs, students can apply to serve as a member of our volunteer staff team, facilitating programs and mentoring their peers. This, too, is a valuable continuation of skill development.

OASL programs go beyond personal development and focus on the importance of group and community development, emphasizing that leadership is not about position or personal gain, but about collaboration for making positive change. We maintain a diverse network of educators, business leaders, community organizers, and other subject matter experts that help us keep our curriculum, facilitator training, and organizational initiatives aligned to this greater leadership purpose. We also continuously update our curriculum to match the evolving needs of students, schools, and communities. Within recent years, we have increased our focus on equitable leadership, social identity, implicit bias, community organizing, and action planning. We also update our curriculum to incorporate the latest Ohio Department of Education's Social Emotional Learning Standards and the Whole Child Framework.

OASL's leadership team is a group of talented Ohio educators, including a school counselor, a high school teacher, an elementary school teacher, and a 20-year classroom teacher/now full-time leadership development professional. Our program directors are all OASL alumni, going back to their own middle school years. Our adult staff members come from a variety of professional backgrounds with years of facilitation and youth development experience. Our peer education model includes a team of thoughtful, responsible, engaged high school and college students who help with program facilitation. With the expertise of our leadership team combined with the talent of our extended network, OASL's commitment to and preparation for training Ohio's student leaders is unparalleled.

Finally, OASL stands on 68 years of experience in the youth leadership education and development world. Our longevity has resulted in an enormous group of alumni that extends across the globe who, without hesitation, credit OASL for contributing to their personal and professional success, fond memories, and lifelong friendships.

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What does success look like?

Over the next three years, OASL is committed to a 50% or more growth of Ohio middle school and high school involvement. When more students - and students from diverse areas and identities - are learning about leadership in community together, their capacity for engaging in leadership for social change increases, and they have greater opportunity for developing transformative relationships (Dugan and Komives, 2010; Rocco, 2017). Access to engaging, transformative leadership development is lacking in diverse communities like those represented in urban and rural areas of Ohio. Increasing access to OASL programs in the state means better serving populations of students that are historically left out of leadership education and development opportunities. In addition, we know that developing student leaders for positive social change requires opportunities for dialogue across difference and experiential learning that includes diverse perspectives. If we are to make real, lasting change in Ohio's schools and communities, increased engagement amongst Ohio's diverse student population is crucial.

Students reflect on and self-report their newly discovered personal strengths as a result of their participation in our programs. Due to the coronavirus, 2019 was the last time we hosted in person events. While we're proud to have pivoted our programs to online and virtual platforms in 2020, we know the greatest learning and growth outcomes occur when students are face-to-face. We eagerly look forward to our return to site-based events as soon as it is safe to do so. In 2019, 98% of respondents reported positive growth outcomes from their experience in our programs. The following were most often identified as their greatest area of growth after participating in our programs:

- 56% named that their greatest improvement was in the area of self confidence.
- 31% reported their greatest improvement was in their comfort voicing opinions, communicating with others and/or speaking in front of a large group
- 35% felt their greatest area of improvement was in their ability to be more outgoing, vulnerable, make connections with peers and strangers
- 25% reported that the greatest improvement was in being more kind, considerate, empathetic and inclusive of others

We receive a great deal of qualitative feedback from our students and alumni alike about the ways in which they feel empowered, challenged, motivated and inclusive as a result of their experiences in our programs.

We take pride in our programs and their impact. We are committed because we believe that what we do matters. We want to reach more students to better equip them for personal success and service to others. We energize and embolden our students with our mantra, "What is learned here, leaves here." As a result, OASL students and alumni positively impact their schools and communities by utilizing the relevant, necessary, and in-demand skills and attitudes we develop and foster.

When my student council advisor required me, a 7th grader newly elected as secretary, to attend training at the 2001 state conference of the Ohio Association of Student Councils (now the Ohio Association of Student Leaders), I had no idea how much the trajectory of my life would be forever changed. I had never been in a space that centered youth this completely, inherently valued their insights, and laid the foundation for them to go out into the world carrying what they'd gained to improve their own communities at home long after the training experience ended. After that, I participated in or volunteered at more than 30 events through high school. In those experiences. I learned how to communicate complex ideas clearly – with both empathy and conviction. I gained a sense of what it required to build true community and shared purpose among people who had vastly different lived experiences. I practiced my speaking skills, and more importantly I exponentially grew my listening skills by learning to always lead with curiosity, be unafraid to ask questions that go deeper than the surface, embrace not knowing or having all of the answers figured out, and model honesty. I made many mistakes, yet I was given space and opportunity to do that in an environment that was safe, encouraging, and celebrated mistakes as part of the formula for success. OASL's programming was the first place where I not only heard about how much kindness matters but saw it consistently manifest in every action. The ethics that were instilled in me through this organization still guide all of my decisions, actions, and professional work as an educator, social worker, and advocate in a very fundamental and tangible way every single day.

As a teenager, my time with OASL taught me about hyper-localized and nonpartisan civic engagement as I played roles in drafting strategic plans; developing programming; coordinating event logistics around housing, fundraising, and transportation; and meeting with elected officials and businesses to cultivate trust and collaboration. This organization does not solely instill the importance of dreaming big in today's young leaders – it empowers youth to build the toolkit, the capacity, and the tangible skills to act on those dreams, to work tirelessly toward desired results, and to intentionally bring people with them along the way. OASL has impacted my life beyond measure - both personally and professionally. As a student attending OASL programming in middle and high school, it taught me critical pillars of being a leader like communication, conflict resolution, and situational leadership that enabled me to diversify my experiences within my school community. OASL helped enrich my learning experiences in a way that enabled me to qualify for one of the highest scholarships and go to college at low cost. Being active in OASL also significantly expanded my worldview beyond my hometown: it gave me direct exposure to see how people grew up in different parts of the state and learn from their lived experiences which helped me develop empathy, deep listening skills and become a better teammate. Additionally, my OASL friends became some of my most supportive relationships in middle and high school, helping me to navigate successes and losses through those formative years. When I entered the workforce, part of the role my new manager quickly tapped me to fill was one that would lead company wide team engagement activities to help adults communicate better, lead with empathy, and have fun doing it. OASL gave me a toolkit not just for my development, but for the development of others. Leading "workshop days" at companies I've worked for is something I have done over the course of my 10+ career in healthcare and biotechnology, including at some of the leading healthcare firms in the Bay Area. People who attended ask how I learned these "activities" that foster "a-ha moments" f even in corporate settings... the story starts with: "well, there's an organization in my state called OASL." OASL's impact is immeasurable in my life - first as a student, then as a facilitator, and now in "corporate America." It's helped me navigate and bring impact to the teams and companies I've been a part of through the years. This letter is to advocate for OASL (Ohio Association of Leaders, formerly OASC – Ohio Association of Student Councils) to receive state funding and support to help the organization reduce costs, offer more need-based scholarships and, in short, help more students have the opportunity to participate in the life-changing OASL experience. I do not use the term, "life-changing" lightly. Looking back on my experience, OASC stands-out as the catalyst in my early years that has shaped me into the person I am today – 30+ years later. In fact, OASC's impact on me has been so profound, that it influences my perspective, actions and interactions still today.

As a sixth grader, I had the benefit of an older brother that had forged a path for me to follow by being an active member of OASC and encouraging me to join. I participated in day-long OASC workshops, attended weekend-long OASC retreats and anxiously looked forward to the week-long OASC summer camps. Middle school, for me, was a formidable experience because of OASC. I, like so many sixth graders, was smart, but did not have drive, ambition or direction. There was little that excited me other than playing outside with friends and watching TV. OASC, and the teachers and mentors that led these organizations and shepherded me to apply myself, awoke in me the desire to become a leader, volunteer, have a purpose and vision for myself and my life.

I turned from a B/C student to an A student, going on to graduate high school as Valedictorian and college Magna Cum Laude. I joined other organizations - Chess Club, Drama Club, Key Club, Art Club, Mock Trial and so many more out of genuine interest and became officers in several of them. I joined cross country and track despite not having much athletic talent but did it because I wanted to challenge myself. I volunteered in the community at art fairs, hospices and hospitals to feel the warmth and joy of giving. I was elected class president all four years of high school, ran for Student Body President at Miami University and came in just short of winning office but remained active and went on to become a Student Trustee on Miami University's Board of Trustees. OASC transformed me into someone that wanted to challenge and better myself and the world and those around me. It made me confident yet caring. It made me assertive yet introspective. It taught me to be self-motivating and how to over-come challenges. I remained intimately involved with OASC through-out high school as a counselor and returned as a volunteer once I graduated college. The organization has remained as powerful and impactful to the students I watched come through the program as it was on me. I saw in these students, the same lost child that I once was, transform before my eyes. The impact the organization had on my life compelled me to encourage my nieces and nephews to participate as well. It was heart-warming to watch them undergo the same transformation that I and the other students go through. I can share countless stories of how they went from the same, undriven students to becoming innovators and leaders in their schools and in their careers afterwards - starting businesses, implementing change in their communities and standing up for their values and beliefs in the face of adversity.

For me, I had a successful career at Procter & Gamble and start my own independent consulting practice thereafter. I have faced challenges through-out and expect I will continue to do so, but I also expect that I will persevere through them; and I can attribute my grit to the lessons OASC taught me.

Even beyond my professional life, I find the values and message of OASC to still reverberate in my actions today. Earlier this week, while watching a TV show with friends (social distanced), the show depicted previously marginalized students that had miraculously become "popular" and exacting revenge on another student that was "popular". Objectively, it was funny, yet I found myself saying to the group, "...I don't agree with this; you don't blow-out someone else's candle to make your own burn brighter." A lesson learned at OASC and lived every day since then. This is not something a 42-year-old man says...but it should be, or rather, it should not have to be. Because this is a lesson learned in one's early, formative years. For this lesson and the thousands of others that OASC taught me, I am grateful and fortunate. I wish for more students to have the same fortune.

Later that year, I vividly remember sitting in the audience listening to a handful of my peers run for the school-wide Student Council Executive Board (i.e., stand up in front of the entire student body and give a speech) and thinking too myself how I would NEVER have the courage to do something like that. That summer, I found myself at my first OASC workshop. My life changed forever. In a short period of time, I found my voice and worth, a passion to serve and lead, the courage to speak my voice, and as an added bonus, my love of the dance floor! Later the following school year, I worked up the nerve to stand before all of Roehm Middle School and make my case to serve on the Student Council Executive Board. To my surprise, I was elected Student Council President.

The following year, I went to a different high school from most of my classmates. I ran and was elected to my Freshman class leadership board.
