A BILL

То	amend section 3301.0712 of the Revised Code to	1
	remove the requirement that students take a	2
	nationally standardized college and career	3
	readiness assessment for high school graduation.	4

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That section 3301.0712 of the Revised Code be	5
amended to read as follows:	6
Sec. 3301.0712. (A) The state board of education, the	7
superintendent of public instruction, and the chancellor of	8
higher education shall develop a system of college and work	9
ready assessments as described in division (B) of this section	10
to assess whether each student upon graduating from high school	11
is ready to enter college or the workforce. Beginning with	12
students who enter the ninth grade for the first time on or	13
after July 1, 2014, the system shall replace the Ohio graduation	14
tests prescribed in division (B)(1) of section 3301.0710 of the	15
Revised Code as a measure of student academic performance and	16
one determinant of eligibility for a high school diploma in the	17
manner prescribed by rule of the state board adopted under	18

division (D) of this section.	19
(B) The college and work ready assessment system shall	20
consist of the following:	21
(1) Nationally (a) Except as provided in division (B)(1)	22
(b) of this section, nationally standardized assessments that	23
measure college and career readiness and are used for college	24
admission. The assessments shall be selected jointly by the	25
state superintendent and the chancellor, and one of which shall	26
be selected by each school district or school to administer to	27
its students. The assessments prescribed under division (B)(1)	28
of this section shall be administered to all eleventh-grade	29
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students in the spring of the school year.	30
(b) Beginning with students who enter the ninth grade for	31
the first time on or after the first day of July immediately	32
following the effective date of this amendment, nationally	33
standardized assessments selected under division (B)(1)(a) of	34
this section shall not be required for graduation. The	35
assessments shall be offered to all eleventh-grade students in	36
the spring of each school year but participation in the	37
assessment is voluntary.	38
(2)(a) Except as provided in division (B)(2)(b) of this	39
section, seven end-of-course examinations, one in each of the	40
areas of English language arts I, English language arts II,	41
science, Algebra I, geometry, American history, and American	42
government. The end-of-course examinations shall be selected	43
jointly by the state superintendent and the chancellor in	44
consultation with faculty in the appropriate subject areas at	45
institutions of higher education of the university system of	46
Ohio. Advanced placement examinations and international	47
baccalaureate examinations, as prescribed under section	48
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3313.6013 of the Revised Code, in the areas of science, American	49
history, and American government may be used as end-of-course	50
examinations in accordance with division (B)(4)(a)(i) of this	51
section. Final course grades for courses taken under any other	52
advanced standing program, as prescribed under section 3313.6013	53
of the Revised Code, in the areas of science, American history,	54
and American government may be used in lieu of end-of-course	55
examinations in accordance with division (B)(4)(a)(ii) of this	56
section.	57

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(b) Beginning with students who enter ninth grade for the 58 first time on or after July 1, 2019, five end-of-course 59 examinations, one in each areas of English language arts II, 60 science, Algebra I, American history, and American government. 61 However, only the end-of-course examinations in English language 62 arts II and Algebra I shall be required for graduation. 63

The department of education shall, as necessary to implement division (B)(2)(b) of this section, seek a waiver from the United States secretary of education for testing requirements prescribed under federal law to allow for the use and implementation of Algebra I as the primary assessment of high school mathematics. If the department does not receive a waiver under this division, the end-of-course examinations for students described in division (B)(2)(b) of this section also shall include an end-of-course examination in the area of geometry. However, the geometry end-of-course examination shall not be required for graduation.

(3) (a) Not later than July 1, 2013, each school district 75 board of education shall adopt interim end-of-course 76 examinations that comply with the requirements of divisions (B) 77 (3)(b)(i) and (ii) of this section to assess mastery of American 78 H. B. No. 82 Page 4

(A)(1)(b) of section 3301.079 of the Revised Code and the topics	80
required under division (M) of section 3313.603 of the Revised	81
Code. Each high school of the district shall use the interim	82
examinations until the state superintendent and chancellor	83
select end-of-course examinations in American history and	84
American government under division (B)(2) of this section.	85
(b) Not later than July 1, 2014, the state superintendent	86
and the chancellor shall select the end-of-course examinations	87
in American history and American government.	88
(i) The end-of-course examinations in American history and	89
American government shall require demonstration of mastery of	90
the American history and American government content for social	91
studies standards adopted under division (A)(1)(b) of section	92
3301.079 of the Revised Code and the topics required under	93
division (M) of section 3313.603 of the Revised Code.	94
(ii) At least twenty per cent of the end-of-course	95
examination in American government shall address the topics on	96
American history and American government described in division	97
(M) of section 3313.603 of the Revised Code.	98
(4)(a) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this	99
section, beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, both of the	100
following shall apply:	101
(i) If a student is enrolled in an appropriate advanced	102
placement or international baccalaureate course, that student	103
shall take the advanced placement or international baccalaureate	104
examination in lieu of the science, American history, or	105
American government end-of-course examinations prescribed under	106
division (B)(2) of this section. The state board shall specify	107

the score levels for each advanced placement examination and	108
international baccalaureate examination for purposes of	109
calculating the minimum cumulative performance score that	110
demonstrates the level of academic achievement necessary to earn	111
a high school diploma.	112
(ii) If a student is enrolled in an appropriate course	113
under any other advanced standing program, as described in	114
section 3313.6013 of the Revised Code, that student shall not be	115
required to take the science, American history, or American	116
government end-of-course examination, whichever is applicable,	117
prescribed under division (B)(2) of this section. Instead, that	118
student's final course grade shall be used in lieu of the	119
applicable end-of-course examination prescribed under that	120
section. The state superintendent, in consultation with the	121
chancellor, shall adopt guidelines for purposes of calculating	122
the corresponding final course grades that demonstrate the level	123
of academic achievement necessary to earn a high school diploma.	124
Division (B)(4)(a)(ii) of this section shall apply only to	125
courses for which students receive transcripted credit, as	126
defined in section 3365.01 of the Revised Code. It shall not	127
apply to remedial or developmental courses.	128
(b) No student shall take a substitute examination or	129
examination prescribed under division (B)(4)(a) of this section	130
in place of the end-of-course examinations in English language	131
arts I, English language arts II, Algebra I, or geometry	132
prescribed under division (B)(2) of this section.	133
(c) The state board shall consider additional assessments	134
that may be used, beginning with the 2016-2017 school year, as	135
substitute examinations in lieu of the end-of-course	136

examinations prescribed under division (B)(2) of this section.

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(5) The state board shall do all of the following:	138
(a) Determine and designate at least five ranges of scores	139
on each of the end-of-course examinations prescribed under	140
division (B)(2) of this section, and substitute examinations	141
prescribed under division (B)(4) of this section. Not later than	142
sixty days after the designation of ranges of scores, the state	143
superintendent, or the state superintendent's designee, shall	144
conduct a public presentation before the standing committees of	145
the house of representatives and the senate that consider	146
primary and secondary education legislation regarding the	147
designated range of scores. Each range of scores shall be	148
considered to demonstrate a level of achievement so that any	149
student attaining a score within such range has achieved one of	150
the following:	151
(i) An advanced level of skill;	152
(ii) An accelerated level of skill;	153
(iii) A proficient level of skill;	154
(iv) A basic level of skill;	155
(v) A limited level of skill.	156
(b) Determine a method by which to calculate a cumulative	157
performance score based on the results of a student's end-of-	158
course examinations or substitute examinations;	159
(c) Determine the minimum cumulative performance score	160
that demonstrates the level of academic achievement necessary to	161
earn a high school diploma under division (A)(2) of section	162
3313.618 of the Revised Code. However, the state board shall not	163
determine a new minimum cumulative performance score after the	164
effective date of this amendment October 17, 2019.	165

(d) Develop a table of corresponding score equivalents for	166
the end-of-course examinations and substitute examinations in	167
order to calculate student performance consistently across the	168
different examinations.	169
A score of two on an advanced placement examination or a	170
score of two or three on an international baccalaureate	171
examination shall be considered equivalent to a proficient level	172
of skill as specified under division (B)(5)(a)(iii) of this	173
section.	174
(6)(a) A student who meets both of the following	175
conditions shall not be required to take an end-of-course	176
examination:	177
(i) The student received high school credit prior to July	178
1, 2015, for a course for which the end-of-course examination is	179
prescribed.	180
(ii) The examination was not available for administration	181
prior to July 1, 2015.	182
Receipt of credit for the course described in division (B)	183
(6)(a)(i) of this section shall satisfy the requirement to take	184
the end-of-course examination. A student exempted under division	185
(B)(6)(a) of this section may take the applicable end-of-course	186
examination at a later date.	187
(b) For purposes of determining whether a student who is	188
exempt from taking an end-of-course examination under division	189
(B)(6)(a) of this section has attained the cumulative score	190
prescribed by division (B)(5)(c) of this section, such student	191
shall select either of the following:	192
(i) The student is considered to have attained a	193
proficient score on the end-of-course examination from which the	194

student is exempt;	195
(ii) The student's final course grade shall be used in	196
lieu of a score on the end-of-course examination from which the	197
student is exempt.	198
The state superintendent, in consultation with the	199
chancellor, shall adopt guidelines for purposes of calculating	200
the corresponding final course grades and the minimum cumulative	201
performance score that demonstrates the level of academic	202
achievement necessary to earn a high school diploma.	203
(7)(a) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this	204
section, the state board may replace the algebra I end-of-course	205
examination prescribed under division (B)(2) of this section	206
with an algebra II end-of-course examination, beginning with the	207
2016-2017 school year for students who enter ninth grade on or	208
after July 1, 2016.	209
(b) If the state board replaces the algebra I end-of-	210
course examination with an algebra II end-of-course examination	211
as authorized under division (B)(7)(a) of this section, both of	212
the following shall apply:	213
(i) A student who is enrolled in an advanced placement or	214
international baccalaureate course in algebra II shall take the	215
advanced placement or international baccalaureate examination in	216
lieu of the algebra II end-of-course examination.	217
(ii) A student who is enrolled in an algebra II course	218
under any other advanced standing program, as described in	219
section 3313.6013 of the Revised Code, shall not be required to	220
take the algebra II end-of-course examination. Instead, that	221
student's final course grade shall be used in lieu of the	222
examination.	223
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(c) If a school district or school utilizes an integrated	224
approach to mathematics instruction, the district or school may	225
do either or both of the following:	226
(i) Administer an integrated mathematics I end-of-course	227
examination in lieu of the prescribed algebra I end-of-course	228
examination;	229
(ii) Administer an integrated mathematics II end-of-course	230
examination in lieu of the prescribed geometry end-of-course	231
examination.	232
(8)(a) For students entering the ninth grade for the first	233
time on or after July 1, 2014, but prior to July 1, 2015, the	234
assessment in the area of science shall be physical science or	235
biology. For students entering the ninth grade for the first	236
time on or after July 1, 2015, the assessment in the area of	237
science shall be biology.	238
(b) Until July 1, 2019, the department shall make	239
available the end-of-course examination in physical science for	240
students who entered the ninth grade for the first time on or	241
after July 1, 2014, but prior to July 1, 2015, and who wish to	242
retake the examination.	243
(c) Not later than July 1, 2016, the state board shall	244
adopt rules prescribing the requirements for the end-of-course	245
examination in science for students who entered the ninth grade	246
for the first time on or after July 1, 2014, but prior to July	247
1, 2015, and who have not met the requirement prescribed by	248
section 3313.618 of the Revised Code by July 1, 2019, due to a	249
student's failure to satisfy division (A)(2) of section 3313.618	250
of the Revised Code.	251
(9) Neither the state board nor the department of	252

education shall develop or administer an end-of-course	253
examination in the area of world history.	254
(10) Not later than March 1, 2020, the department, in	255
consultation with the chancellor and the governor's office of	256
workforce transformation, shall determine a competency score for	257
both of the Algebra I and English language arts II end-of-course	258
examinations for the purpose of graduation eligibility.	259
(C) The state board shall convene a group of national	260
experts, state experts, and local practitioners to provide	261
advice, guidance, and recommendations for the alignment of	262
standards and model curricula to the assessments and in the	263
design of the end-of-course examinations prescribed by this	264
section.	265
(D) Upon completion of the development of the assessment	266
system, the state board shall adopt rules prescribing all of the	267
following:	268
(1) A timeline and plan for implementation of the	269
assessment system, including a phased implementation if the	270
state board determines such a phase-in is warranted;	271
(2) The date after which a person shall meet the	272
requirements of the entire assessment system as a prerequisite	273
for a diploma of adult education under section 3313.611 of the	274
Revised Code;	275
(3) Whether and the extent to which a person may be	276
excused from an American history end-of-course examination and	277
an American government end-of-course examination under division	278
(H) of section 3313.61 and division (B)(3) of section 3313.612	279
of the Revised Code;	280
(4) The date after which a person who has fulfilled the	281

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curriculum requirement for a diploma but has not passed one or	282
more of the required assessments at the time the person	283
fulfilled the curriculum requirement shall meet the requirements	284
of the entire assessment system as a prerequisite for a high	285
school diploma under division (B) of section 3313.614 of the	286
Revised Code;	287
(5) The extent to which the assessment system applies to	288
students enrolled in a dropout recovery and prevention program	289
for purposes of division (F) of section 3313.603 and section	290
3314.36 of the Revised Code.	291
(E) Not later than forty-five days prior to the state	292
board's adoption of a resolution directing the department to	293
file the rules prescribed by division (D) of this section in	294
final form under section 119.04 of the Revised Code, the	295
superintendent of public instruction shall present the	296
assessment system developed under this section to the respective	297
committees of the house of representatives and senate that	298
consider education legislation.	299
(F)(1) Any person enrolled in a nonchartered nonpublic	300
school or any person who has been excused from attendance at	301
school for the purpose of home instruction under section 3321.04	302
of the Revised Code may choose to participate in the system of	303
assessments administered under divisions (B)(1) and (2) of this	304
section. However, no such person shall be required to	305
participate in the system of assessments.	306
(2) The department shall adopt rules for the	307
administration and scoring of any assessments under division (F)	308
(1) of this section.	309

(G) Not later than December 31, 2014, the state board

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shall select at least one nationally recognized job skills	311
assessment. Each school district shall administer that	312
assessment to those students who opt to take it. The state shall	313
reimburse a school district for the costs of administering that	314
assessment. The state board shall establish the minimum score a	315
student must attain on the job skills assessment in order to	316
demonstrate a student's workforce readiness and employability.	317
The administration of the job skills assessment to a student	318
under this division shall not exempt a school district from	319
administering the assessments prescribed in division (B) of this	320
section to that student.	321
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Section 2. That existing section 3301.0712 of the Revised	322
Code is hereby repealed.	323
