BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF OHIO (THE SENATE CONCURRING):

WHEREAS, An imparance of earning power exists in our	3
economy, where income for the bottom 90% of households in the	4
United States increased by 1.1% from 1980 to 2017, while income	5
for the wealthiest 1% increased by 184%; and	6
WHEREAS, When workers join or organize a union, they are	7
demonstrating the power of collective action as a countervailing	8
force for the benefit of their interests as working people; and	9
WHEREAS, Princeton University researchers, in a 2018 study	10
titled "Unions and Inequality Over the Twentieth Century: New	11
Evidence from Survey Data" published in the National Bureau of	12
Economic Research, found that over the past eight decades, union	13
membership consistently provided union workers with a 10% to 20%	14
higher wage than their non-union counterparts; and	15

WHEREAS, Unions are critical to increasing wages for	16
workers and reducing income inequality; and	17
WHEREAS, Current labor law does not provide sufficient	18
protections for workers who wish to organize with their co-	19
workers; and	20
WHEREAS, The Protecting the Right to Organize Act of 2021	21
is comprehensive legislation designed to strengthen protections	22
for workers' rights to organize a union and bargain collectively	23
for higher wages, better benefits, and safer working conditions;	24

WHEREAS, The Protecting the Right to Organize Act of 2021	26
removes barriers to organizing, reduces interference with the	27
election process by prohibiting required attendance at anti-	28
union meetings, and makes it easier for workers and employers to	29
negotiate an initial collective bargaining agreement by creating	30
a mediation and arbitration process; and	31
WHEREAS, The Protecting the Right to Organize Act of 2021	32
protects workers' right to strike for basic workplace	33
improvements by prohibiting the hiring of permanent replacements	34
for striking workers, and narrows the definition of independent	35
contractor to eliminate employee misclassification, which is a	36
common tactic used to avoid employee protections under the	37
National Labor Relations Act, such as the right to organize; and	38
WHEREAS, The Protecting the Right to Organize Act of 2021	39
establishes meaningful penalties for violations of workers'	40
rights under the National Labor Relations Act, and safeguards	41
workers' access to justice by authorizing a private right of	42
action for violations of workers' rights and fairer remedies for	43
workers who experience retaliation, discrimination, or other	44
interference with the right to act concertedly, join a union, or	45
bargain collectively; and	46

WHEREAS, The Protecting the Right to Organize Act of 2021	47
permits fair share fee arrangements to promote workers' freedom	48
of association, encourage collective bargaining, and cover the	49
cost of union representation; and	50
WHEREAS, The Protecting the Right to Organize Act of 2021	51
increases transparency in labor-management relations by	52
requiring employers to post notices informing workers of their	53
rights to organize and bargain collectively; and	54
WHEREAS, Public support for unions is soaring as a recent	55
Gallup survey found that 65% of Americans have a favorable view	56
of labor unions, and another study by the Massachusetts	57
Institute of Technology found that nearly 60 million American	58
workers would join a union if they could; and	59
WHEREAS, On March 9, 2021, the United States House of	60
Representatives voted in favor of enacting the Protecting the	61
Right to Organize Act of 2021; now therefore be it	62
RESOLVED, That we, the members of the 134th General	63
Assembly of the State of Ohio, in adopting this resolution, urge	64
the Congress of the United States to enact the Protecting the	65
Right to Organize Act of 2021; and be it further	66
RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the House of Representatives	67
transmit duly authenticated copies of this resolution to the	68
Speaker and Clerk of the United States House of Representatives,	69
the President Pro Tempore and Secretary of the United States	70
Senate, each member of the Ohio Congressional delegation, and	71
