Ohio University offers enthusiastic support for the Foster-to-College Scholarship Program proposed in House Bill (HB) 164, the Foster Care Education Support Act. This scholarship program expands access to Ohio's outstanding higher education ecosystem for some of the most vulnerable and deserving youth in our state—students our state's colleges and universities are pleased to welcome and proud to support.

We have seen time and again that foster care children face unique challenges accessing the state's public institutions due to limited resources and support networks. When we close the gap between available federal and state grants and the full cost of attendance on one of the state's residential campuses, for example, we absolutely can deliver an outstanding academic experience that helps level the playing field and prepares them for career success, but we also can welcome more students in to our communities of care—providing even greater access to our institutions' residence halls, meal plans, and the excellent, robust student support services that distinguish Ohio's higher ed residential campuses.

In addition to its Athens campus, Ohio University's five regional campuses remain ready to welcome these students. The proposed scholarship program provides the opportunity for impacted students to stay in their communities while earning a top-notch degree, certificate or credential that can accelerate access to the state's workforce.

Investing in and furthering the education of foster care youth in Ohio is an investment in the future of our state. At institutions like OHIO, caring faculty, and staff welcome foster care youth into our communities and support them on their path to academic success, successful career outcomes and a brighter future.
