

House Bill 164 – Written Proponent Testimony
House Higher Education Committee, June 7, 2023

Chairman Young, Vice Chair Manning, Ranking Member Miller and members of the House Higher Education Committee, please accept my written testimony in support of House Bill 164 on behalf of the University of Cincinnati. I am Jack Miner, Vice Provost for Enrollment Management at UC. I oversee all university functions related to admissions, financial aid, registration, advising, and student services. I greatly appreciate the effort that House Bill 164 makes to close an important access gap for prospective UC students coming from our foster care system.

At the University of Cincinnati, we are proud to embrace our role as an urban public university. Under President Pinto's strategic direction, Next Lives Here, we are leading urban public universities to a new era of innovation and impact. This spans the entirety of our university operations, but plays a fundamental role into how we approach our work in Enrollment Management. Our goal is to expand the scope of our mission by increasing our impact across all of the communities we serve.
