All they want is to exist and to belong. That is all. but they can't. I don't want to see my best friend in the world stop smiling. They're only sixteen years old. It would break my heart.

To conclude my statement on HB 68 I would like to say with confidence that the state of Ohio is not just a place, but a home. Unfortunately I cannot, because for many it is far from it. I hope I am not alone in my desire to strive towards a world in which all beings can flourish and find beauty and love, rather than hate and fear in the fact of one another's existence. Creating communities of care and understanding is the only way to achieve this because it promotes accepting spaces where all people can share and learn and grow. It nourishes our natural inclinations towards empathy, and love. Gender affirming care is like a lighthouse in a vast ocean. It helps people find their way home. Without it they would be lost. And when you're lost at sea, more often than not, you drown. I am frightened by this fact, for I know the most wonderful, and brilliantly kind human being who is trying to find their way home too, and so I beg of you, please don't let them drown.
