Chairman Lipps, Vice Chairman Stewart, Ranking Member Liston, and members of the House Public Health Policy Committee:

Thank you for allowing me to present sponsor testimony on House Bill 207 today. This bill aims to clarify the roles of the Ohio Department of Health and the Ohio Department of Agriculture as it relates to inspecting special use pools and aquatic amusement rides.

Currently, there is no clarification in the Ohio Revised Code for aquatic amusement rides. Because of this ambiguity, Ohio has seen disease outbreaks at well-known aquatic amusement parks around the State. This bill seeks to ensure the best possible safety standards are met and that inspections are done by those best qualified and experienced to do so.

ODH has jurisdiction over water quality in public pools, but not in aquatic amusement rides. ODA inspects both water quality and the mechanical components in these aquatic rides. ODH and by extension local health districts, has the expertise in water quality and disease transmission in water rides and pools, under the bill, ODH and local health districts will inspect the water quality of the pools that rides

empty into to prevent the spread of waterborne diseases. This will increase our ability to prevent disease transmission in all water rides and pools in Ohio.

Many of these pools are already found in amusement parks where both ODH and ODA already work. This is not creating a new regulation or burden for the parks. Instead, it is shifting these responsibilities.

We want to ensure that Ohioans can safely enjoy aquatic amusement rides and public pools. I believe that House Bill 207 will make that happen.
