### **Rules Report**

The House Rules and Reference committee met on Tuesday, June 11, 2024, at 10:00 a.m.

The following matters, being properly before the committee and pursuant to House Rule 66, were scheduled for third consideration on the House calendar in the order indicated below for the date indicated below.

Wednesday, June 12, 2024

**Sub. H. B. No. 380 Hillyer, Miller, K., et al.** – To make multiple highway and bridge designations.

**Sub. S. B. No. 40 Roegner, et al.** – To enter into the Dentist and Dental Hygienist Compact and to address limitations imposed by health insurers on dental care services.

**Sub. H. B. No. 7 White, Humphrey, et al.** – To support strong foundations for Ohio mothers and babies in their first one thousand days to address maternal and infant mortality, to improve health, developmental, and learning outcomes for babies and mothers through expanded prenatal, postnatal, infant, and toddler health care and early intervention and wraparound services and supports; to amend the versions of sections 5180.21, 5180.22, and 5180.32 of the Revised Code that are scheduled to take effect January 1, 2025, to continue those changes on and after that date; to designate those provisions the Strong Foundations Act; to require health plan issuers to cover hearing aids and related services for persons age twenty-one and younger; and to make appropriations.

**Am. H. B. No. 164 Jarrells, Seitz, et al.** – To establish the Foster-to-College Scholarship Program, to require the Department of Education and Workforce to hire a full-time school foster care liaison, and to make an appropriation for the Foster-to-College Scholarship Program.

**Sub. H. B. No. 236 Miller, M., Lear, et al.** – To prohibit a congregate care setting from denying a patient or resident access to an advocate during public health emergencies and to name this act the Never Alone Act.

**H. B. No. 364 Dobos, Klopfenstein, et al.** – To exempt certain noncommercial seed sharing activities from the laws governing seed labeling, inspection, and advertising and to alter the requirements specifying which noxious weeds must be destroyed on a toll road, railroad, or electric railway.



**H. B. No. 503 Peterson, Jones** – To prohibit certain activities regarding garage-fed swine, feral swine, and wild boar.

**Am. H. B. No. 403 Cutrona, et al.** – To create new causes of action in relation to vehicles towed after an accident.

**Sub. H. B. No. 378 Lorenz, Santucci, et al.** – To authorize a full homestead exemption for surviving spouses of members of the uniformed services killed in the line of duty and to abate property taxes on certain municipal and community improvement corporation property.

**H. B. No. 303 Hall, Santucci, et al.** – To establish a process for the revision of training subjects for EMS personnel.

**Am. H. B. No. 178 Brent, Callender, et al.** – To enact the Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair (CROWN) Act to prohibit discrimination by a public school against an individual based on hair texture and protective hair styles and to amend the version of section 3314.03 of the Revised Code that is scheduled to take effect January 1, 2025, to continue the changes on and after that effective date.

**Am. H. B. No. 432 Jones, et al.** – Regarding the teaching of career-technical education.

**H. C. R. No. 11 Klopfenstein, King, et al.** – To condemn the People's Republic of China for its role in the global drug trade, especially in its capacity as the largest point of origin of fentanyl smuggled to the United States.

**Sub. H. B. No. 289 Robb Blasdel, Swearingen, et al.** – To provide that if a Tier I or Tier II sex offender/child-victim offender fails to comply with duties under the SORN law, the period of time that the offender has a duty to comply is tolled during the time of the failure and to require a sex offender/child-victim offender to register a fixed residence address or provide a detailed description of the places at which the offender or delinquent child intends to stay under the SORN Law.

**Sub. H. B. No. 331 Mathews, Young, T., et al.** – To modify the law regarding village dissolution.

**Sub. H. B. No. 327 Wiggam, Swearingen, et al.** – To require certain government contractors and employers to use E-verify.
