Chair Brenner, Vice Chair O'Brien, Ranking Member Ingram, and members of the Senate Education Committee,

Thank you for allowing me to testify today. My name is Olivia Adkins, and I am 25 years old. I am an aunt to students in the Beavercreek School District, and I am here today to express my strong opposition to SB 293 and its House counterpart, HB 445.

I am deeply concerned about these bills because I believe they undermine the core values of public education and limit students' access to important resources. As an active member of my community, I've seen firsthand how crucial a supportive, inclusive, and well-funded education system is for all students. These bills threaten to remove critical protections for teachers and students, particularly those in marginalized groups, and could lead to a more divisive, less supportive environment in our schools.
