HB8 Written Testimony Opponent Written-Only Testimony for HB8 Senate Education Committee 12/9/2024

Chair Brenner, Vice Chair O'Brien, Ranking Member Ingram, and members of the Senate Education Committee,

Thank you for allowing me to testify today. My name is Theresa Augustin (She/Her). I am a software project manager and a small business owner of 10+ years. I am also a Research Assistant at Cleveland State University's School of Law studying Data Privacy and Cybersecurity. I am currently working for an ecommerce AI platform. I oppose the bill in its entirety.

After exhibiting depression, I told a teacher that I was attracted to the same-sex. She suggested I talk to my parents to get support. Following the conversation with my parents, their reaction was so strong that I moved out of their house and sunk further into depression. I was fortunate that I had friends to support with housing and basic needs and could provide for my basic needs. I fear that this bill will have impacts on children's mental health and increase youth homelessness.

From a data privacy perspective, the bill infringes on UNICEF's Rights for Children 16: Protection of Privacy, 13: Sharing Thoughts Freely, 14: Freedom of Thought and Religion. The intention of data protections for children is to protect the child from commercial surveillance. Electronic Privacy Information Center (EPIC.org) encourages a comprehensive privacy law. The EPIC comments to the NTIA on RFC state 'the constant monitoring and profiling of children online can make it difficult to develop a sense of autonomy and personality' (Epic). I believe HB8 does not uphold the intention of privacy from commercial surveillance, but rather puts children at risk and prohibits children from developing autonomy, personality and identity.

As a lesbian woman and passionate data privacy software expert, I do not believe that HB8 is aligned with the intention to support the growth and safety of children. I believe that HB8 does not protect children's data privacy and if enacted would be a driver of youth homelessness and mental health. I ask that you consider the intention of this bill and vote no.
