Carry out public relations and media management strategy, which includes print, radio, and television interviews, as well as participation in editorial boards, press conferences, and media events.

Develop ideologies and best practices that contribute to development of OSHP policies and procedures. Formulate and oversee execution of OSHP operational and administrative plans. Meet with executive staff to assess progress toward meeting OSHP goals. Engage OSHP personnel to stay abreast of morale levels and address needs. Approve trooper participation in federal, state, and local task force operations such as Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), US Marshals Service, and Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) Joint Terrorism Task Force (JTTF), as well as local human trafficking and drug task forces.

- Enhanced OSHP focus on diversity and inclusion, committing to adding as core area of concentration across sworn officers
 and professional staff. Successfully addressed challenges of recruiting and maintaining female and minority candidates.
 Presided over OSHP during promotion of first female in department history to achieve rank of Lieutenant Colonel.
- Led 3-month initiative to travel statewide and meet with all 9 OSHP districts and headquarters components to conduct town hall meetings with staff to communicate focal points and share expectations relative to:
 - Reestablished OSHP use of data to deploy troopers to address traffic crashes, impaired/distracted drivers, and
 interdict criminals using Ohio's roadways. Overcame initial internal unpopularity, eventually achieving improved
 control over OSHP resources, which bolstered efficiency and allowed focus on reducing fatal crashes in non-urban
 areas of state.
 - Redeployed troopers to townships and counties statewide, only operating in urban areas upon request to address traffic and crime-related issues.
 - Implemented requirement of data for use in initiatives.
- Enhanced quality of command staff by instituting command-level higher education requirement.
- Orchestrated deployment of 80 troopers, in response to request from Minnesota State Patrol Superintendent, to assist with riots and unrest resulting from death of George Floyd and culmination of Derrick Chauvin trial, with Ohio Governor Mike DeWine receiving letter of commendation from House of Representatives on behalf of OSHP.
- Requested by Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs (INL) to send group of OSHP traffic crash reconstructionists to Thailand to teach traffic crash investigation to Thailand Police Department.

- Instituted policy to ensure equity and inclusion were factors in selecting diverse pool of officers to participate in sought after opportunities, involving serving as assessors to assist with conducting promotional assessment centers.
- Led extensive overhaul of entire biennial administrative audits process, reducing administrative burden while improving efficiency. Process widely praised by OSHP personnel for improving efficiency, eliminating unnecessary processes, and reducing uneasiness experienced by facility personnel in preparing for process.
 - Eliminated several administratively and operationally time-consuming processes from inspection and freed up time for sergeants to supervise troopers.
 - Created smart template, complete with drop-down boxes and auto-filling for use in each audit, credited with saving time for auditors.
 - Created risk assessment process, conducted on off years for every installation to ensure proper completion of
 critical items involving high degree of risk as a stop gap between audits.
 - Codified annual assessment of process in policy to identify potential improvements.
 - Recommended process name change from "Inspections" to "Audits".
- Tasked training academy with completely revamping field training process. Revamped field training process by going from 1 to up to 3 training officers for all 3 shifts. Provided more well-rounded evaluation of new troopers and allowed training officers to tap into specific learning style of each trainee while also increasing trainee probability of success. Mandated transition to electronic field training documentation manual, which saved time and improved efficiency.

Captain Office of Investigative Services, Office of Special Operations, Office of Criminal Investigations (2011-2015)

Office of Investigative Services – Managed and directed plainclothes personnel conducting investigations in Ohio's prisons and assisting Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections personnel with investigating crimes occurring within Ohio's prison population. Transferred to serve as executive officer of newly created Office of Special Operations after only 2 months.

Office of Special Operations – Oversaw shift from reactive to proactive operations by Investigative Services personnel. Supervised support operations with Criminal Patrol personnel to take over drug case investigations and work intelligence and leads generated from cases to prosecute suppliers of illicit drugs and seize proceeds of sales and distribution to dismantle drug trafficking organizations (DTO). Collaborated with federal, state, and local agencies to maximize resources and diversify efforts to combat DTOs.

Office of Criminal Investigations – Appointed to establish structure for newly created Criminal Patrol Unit, created to consolidate canine handler teams and troopers assigned to interdict drugs and illegal weapons. Created entire unit structure.

- Teamed with Department of Public Safety personnel to stand up Office of Criminal Investigations, including locating office space, securing furniture, identifying administrative staff, and recommending 7 lieutenants and several sergeants for promotion that would provide unit oversight. Generated record seizures of drugs, weapons, and proceeds from drug sales and other criminal activity statewide. OSHP efforts recognized by Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), resulting in placement of full-time troopers on DEA and HSI task forces for first time in OSHP history.
- Developed and implemented Shield Details, which involved using crime and traffic data in cities throughout Ohio to combat crime and traffic problems.

Oversaw Risk Management Unit; identified and mitigated risks that potentially exposed Division to liability that could result in litigation or monetary loss. - Recommended adoption of revisions to clarify existing policy regarding supervisory oversight to ensure against officers surpassing 12-hour maximum overtime worked on day off or addition of no more than 4 hours to regular 8-hour shifts.
