Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee Opponent Testimony on S.B. No. 117 Gabriella Velasquez Galvan June 6, 2023

Chairman Cirino, Vice-Chair Michael Rulli, Ranking Member Kent Smith, and members of the Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee:

Please consider the following testimony in adamant opposition to Senate Bill 117. I am Gabriella Velasquez Galvan, a student at the University of Toledo College of Law ("College of Law"), the current President of the Latino Law Student Association ("LLSA"), and Managing Editor of the Law Review, Board 55. I am also the Student Liaison of the Allies, a dedicated group of student organization leaders determined to increase diversity, equity, and inclusion on campus while ensuring a welcoming community for our underrepresented and marginalized students. While the roles I lead on campus are incredibly important to me, the following testimony is a compilation of my thoughts and my thoughts alone.

There are many ways in which the College of Law can improve upon itself to "cultivate the next generation of leaders in the legal profession"; however, none of those ways include an expansion solely on constitutional law. The one thing that the College of Law can pride itself on is a robust constitutional law program consisting of professors with varying viewpoints and a focus on "intellectual diversity". There is a strong Federalist Society presence on campus that hosts numerous speakers and events through the support of their national organization and ties with faculty. There are constant discussions and debates about constitutional issues that are encouraged by faculty and administration. All of this to say, there is not a lack of support for the constitutional curriculum and there has been an increase in meaningful discussion surrounding the constitution.

There are far better ways for funding of this caliber to be utilized to assist the College of Law, such as an increase in diversity of race, national origin, and ethnicity as well as sexual orientation and ability. When there is an increase in diversity of people, there are bound to be new viewpoints, which in turn would increase "intellectual diversity". The College of Law is not reaching its potential to expand on civil discourse when the majority of students are seeing from similar racial and ethnic lenses. According to the College's 2022 Standard 509 Information

Report, across four cohorts consisting of full- and part-time students, 7 students identified as "Hispanic of any race", 6 students identified as "Asian", 18 students identified as "Black or African American", and no students that identified as "American Indian or Alaska Native" or "Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander" (Exhibit A, page 2). Including multiracial students, there are a total of 51 students of color out of a total of 355 students across all cohorts (Exhibit A, page 2). As one of the three Latinx students in my cohort, I strongly believe that a focus on diversity outside of diversity of thought would be beneficial to widening the spectrum of discourse that could be had at the College of Law.

As shown by testimony from numerous students and alumni, there is not an issue of cultivating leaders in the legal profession. Future leaders have been formed in part through the constitutional curriculum that is currently present, but largely due to there being constant discussions surrounding constitutional issues on campus and in current events. It is distasteful and insulting to insinuate that such a large sum of funds go to one section of the law that students already vigorously participate in and seek to expand their knowledge on independently.
