






## INFANT VITALITY DATA

## Initiative Details

- Spread and scale Cradle Cincinnati Model.
- Increase community and faith-based support to create community synergy and leverage community needs assessments to identify continued or future investments.

- Increase home visiting to more than 25,000 additional children over the biennium through a phased approach to grow the Family Connects model as outlined in the 2024 State of the State Address.



#### **Initiative Details**

Maintain eligibility for families working and going to school at 200% of the federal poverty level (FPL). By expanding eligibility for publicly funded child care from 145% to 160% of the FPL and maintaining the Child Care Choice Voucher Program for families 161% - 200%.

- Family of 3: \$51,648 income
- Family of 4: \$62,400 income




## **INCREASE ELIGIBILITY**

- Annual child care costs a family with one infant approximately \$11,000 while a family with an infant and one toddler can expect to pay nearly \$22,000 a year.
- This is estimated to be between 10% of a dual income family up to more than **39% of a single parent's annual income**.
- In 2024-2025, Ohio in-state tuition at a public college or university per student was around \$13,000.

#### Child Care vs. Household Expenses


When compared to other household expenses, child care often has the highest price.

## **CHILD CARE GOALS FOR FY2026/2027 BUDGET**

- **1. Children**: Maintain support for children in families up to 200% of the FPL to make child care accessible and affordable.
- 2. Families: Streamline the application process to one front door through Ohio Benefits easing access.
- 3. Providers: Streamline payments and increase to the 2024 market rate to stabilize the industry.
- 4. State: Meet federal compliance for the Child Care Development Block Grant and support families.

#### **REQUIRED BY 08/1/2026**

- ✓ 7% cap on parent co-pays
- ✓ Payment by enrollment to providers
- ✓ Pay at the 50<sup>th</sup> percentile of the 2024 market rate



## **EARLY IDENTIFICATION & LITERACY**



#### **Early Intervention**

- Year 1: \$7M
- Year 2: \$9M

#### <u>Total Investment</u>

- SFY 2026: \$30.6M
- **SFY 2027:** \$32.7M



#### **Imagination Library**

- Year 1: \$2M
- Year 2: \$2M

#### <u>Total Investment</u>

- **SFY 2026:** \$10M
- **SFY 2027:** \$10M



#### Early Intervention:

- As a result of increased referrals, and the additional 1,100 children served last year funding is needed to ensure timely evaluations, assessments, and service coordination.
- Studies show that one out of every three children who receive Early Intervention no longer need specialized services when they enter kindergarten.

#### Dolly Parton's Imagination Library of Ohio:

- 62% of Ohio's children birth through age five are receiving a book each month.
- More than 5,200 children in foster care have been enrolled.
- A 2023 study reported:
  - Nearly four in five children are reading with their parents/guardians more after receiving the books.
  - About 90% of respondents believe children are better prepared for kindergarten.

#### **CHILD WELLNESS CAMPUSES & STATE CHILD PROTECTION FUNDING**



Wellness Campuses One-Time Funding

- Year 1: \$20M
- Year 2: \$10M



#### **Initiative Details**

Regional Wellness Campuses will create **new placement options** so that no children have to stay overnight in lobbies or hotels, resulting in fewer displacements and quicker reunification with families.



- Year 1: \$25M
- Year 2: \$30M

#### <u>Total Investment</u>

- **SFY 26:** \$180M
- **SFY 27:** \$185M




#### **Initiative Details**

Expanded investment in this line will support local governments with **timely investigations** and the increased **cost of care**.
