



**HOUSE DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE  
S.B. 6 - PROPONENT TESTIMONY**

Chair Hoops, Vice Chair Lorenz, Ranking Member Abdullahi, and Representatives on the Development Committee:

The Associated General Contractors (AGC) of Ohio would like to express support for Senate Bill 6, legislation that would create an expedited building appeals process.

AGC of Ohio is a construction association representing large and small, union and open shop (non-union), commercial building, and industrial contractors across the state. Our members build vertical structures in both the public and private arenas. They work with building departments from the very start of the project during the plan approval process; throughout the building inspection process; and until the owner receives the final occupancy permits.

AGC appreciates Senator Roegner's efforts to help the building industry with this legislation. Under current law, a typical building appeal can last 30-60 days. The lengthy timeframe negatively impacts a project. Oftentimes, a portion of the work needs to be put on hold. That delay hurts the entire project timeline, the construction team (contractors, subcontractors, tradespeople), and the project's owner, who wants to occupy the building as soon as possible to begin operations. Delays are very burdensome and expensive for everyone involved.

While considering the needs of those directly engaged in the project, we must also consider the bill's impact on the local and state building appeals boards – their ability to do their job and provide appropriate customer service to the industry. During the 134<sup>th</sup> General Assembly, Senator Roegner worked with industry groups, including ours, and municipalities on an amendment designed to avoid overwhelming appeals boards and prevent potential abuses of the process. This included expanding the

time frame for an expedited hearing to five days after an expedited appeal is requested (excluding holidays and weekends). The bill also ensures that potential remedies within the local building department (outside of litigation) are exhausted before an expedited appeal can be requested. These two items should avoid overwhelming appeals boards and ensure they can continue to provide an appropriate level of service to the industry.

This is the third General Assembly with this legislation. This same bill passed the Senate unanimously twice. It even passed the House unanimously last year (but included unrelated amendments, and time ran out for a concurrence vote and conference committee).

AGC of Ohio is grateful for Sen. Roegner's perseverance and this committee's consideration. We respectfully urge you to support S.B. 6.
