

#### House Finance Committee House Bill 54 Interested Party Testimony February 19, 2025

Chair Stewart, Vice Chair Dovilla, Ranking Member Sweeney and members of the House Finance Committee, thank you for the opportunity to submit written interested party testimony regarding House Bill 54 (H.B. 54), the state transportation budget.

Ohio Rural Development Alliance (ORDA) supports the rural transportation planning grant program for regional transportation planning organization (RTPOs) and believes the earmark of \$5 million per fiscal year over the biennium should be reinstated in H.B. 54 (DOTCD5: Section 203.45).

By way of background, the Ohio Rural Development Alliance (ORDA) is an organization of regional transportation planning organizations ("RTPOs") and other entities dedicated to economic parity for Ohio's rural communities. ORDA's members advocate for policies that create sustainable and diverse economic growth and prosperity in their communities. ORDA believes the RTPOs provide unique solutions and perspectives on regional transportation issues and give great insight to the Ohio Department of Transportation when implementing statewide planning activities. Ohio's RTPOs provide transportation planning products and services to the non-metropolitan regions of Ohio, and work with both ODOT and local stakeholders to facilitate an integrated approach and support better informed transportation decision making in Ohio. RTPOs have established many successes within the current operational framework. Seven years into the program, RTPOs are trusted local partners and facilitators.

Ohio's six RTPOs serve their local communities by providing critical transportation planning. The six RTPOs are listed below.

- <u>Buckeye Hills Regional Council</u> (Athens, Hocking, Meigs, Monroe, Morgan, Noble, Perry, and Washington Counties)
- <u>Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization</u> (Fairfield, Knox, Madison, Marion, Morrow, Pickaway and Union Counties)
- <u>Logan-Union-Champaign Regional Planning Commission</u> (Logan and Champaign Counties)




- <u>Maumee Valley Planning Organization</u> (Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding, and Williams Counties)
- <u>Ohio Mid-Eastern Governments Association</u> (Carroll, Columbiana, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Muskingum, and Tuscarawas Counties)
- <u>Ohio Valley Regional Development Commission</u> (Adams, Brown, Fayette, Gallia, Highland, Jackson, part of Lawrence, Pike, Ross, Scioto, and Vinton Counties)

To better meet the needs of the rural regions of Ohio, the RTPOs received additional planning dollars in a new grant program, the rural transportation planning grant program, in the 134<sup>th</sup> General Assembly's transportation budget, House Bill 74. The grant program required each RTPO to develop a process for receiving and reviewing project applications. In H.B. 23 of the 135<sup>th</sup> General Assembly, the planning grant program received \$ 5 million per fiscal year. For additional information on the type of projects funded through the grant program, please find attached the RTPOs Planning for Program-Impact Report 2024.

ORDA supports the planning grant program, and it should be reinstated in H.B. 54. To continue the success and build on the momentum of the previous rural transportation planning grant program, ORDA believes the program should continue.

We encourage this committee to support the rural transportation planning grant program and reinstate the funding for the program. ### Introduction

An Ohio Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO) plays a crucial role in regional transportation planning and development. Overall, RTPOs aim to create a more efficient, effective, and sustainable transportation system within their region, addressing both current and future needs. RTPOs provide transportation planning services and give voice to the non-metropolitan regions of Ohio. RTPOs work alongside the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) and local stakeholders to coordinate plans for regional needs and make better informed transportation decisions in Ohio.

ODOT created the program in 2013, and over the last eleven years RTPOs have developed transportation expertise, regional transportation databases, public engagement policies, and long-range multimodal transportation plans supporting economic and community development activity for their region of the state.

House Bill 23 of the 135th Ohio General Assembly increased the original five million dollar allocation to \$10 million to be spent evenly in FY2024 and FY2025. With help from advisory committees made up of local stakeholders, each RTPO developed the guidelines, project applications, and scoring criteria needed to select projects for funding. The responsive programs that were developed out of this process are tailored to the needs of each region.

In the past, some critical projects were hard to fund because they didn't fit any of the current programs. The RTPO allocation of funds helps many of these projects now move forward. Continuation of this funding and future growth is vital to improving local transportation networks, and this report will showcase some of the projects local stakeholders have prioritized.

RTPOs have established many successes within the current operational framework and now, more than a decade into the program, RTPOs are trusted local partners and facilitators. This document will outline the existing contributions of Ohio's RTPOs and efforts to expand, adding new roles and responsibilities as they grow to meet the demands of the people and communities they serve.

A designated Ohio RTPO, in partnership with ODOT, seeks to encourage local officials to have more input on transportation decisions within their region, because local participation is critical for allocating resources to make high priority transportation decisions with limited state and federal budgets.

RTPOs work on a wide range of projects, including data collection and analysis, traffic counts, inter-agency consultation and stakeholder outreach, transportation project planning, grant writing, and project funding research.


The Ohio RTPOs work with ODOT to accomplish the following basic work items as part of a larger scope of work:

- The creation and adoption of a Public Participation Plan
- The creation and adoption of a regional Long-Range Transportation Plan
- The development and adoption of a Transportation Improvement Plan
- The moderation of an ongoing and inclusive public involvement and outreach process

The RTPO program allows rural areas to participate in transportation planning, somewhat mirroring the process that currently happens in major metropolitan areas through the designated MPO's of Ohio. The RTPOs envision a transportation system in their respective regions that is connected, safe, well maintained, accessible to all users, environmentally sustainable, and supportive of economic vitality.

### Murray City Milling and Paving, Murray City in **Hocking County**

Total Project Cost - \$410,000 Total RTPO Funds in Project - \$200,000 Total Leveraged Investment - \$210,000 Project Partners/Collaborators - Village of Murray City, ODOT District 10, Buckeye Hills Regional Council RTPO

The Murray City Milling and Paving project aims to enhance road quality by addressing and repairing potholes through milling and paving. This improvement will ensure smoother, safer travel for residents and visitors, and extend the lifespan of the city's road infrastructure. Investing in milling and paving projects improves infrastructure and enhances the overall quality of life and economic vitality of a small rural community and its surrounding region.

#### **Caldwell Exempt Village School District Campus Connectivity, Caldwell Elementary School in Noble County**

Total Project Cost - \$3,632,359 Total RTPO Funds in Project - \$357,359 Total Leveraged Investment – \$3,275,000

Project Partners and/or Collaborators – Caldwell Exempted Village School District, Noble County Engineer, Noble County Commissioners, Village of Caldwell, ODOT District 10, and Buckeye Hills Regional Council RTPO

The project aims to improve safety, connectivity, and community health and well-being by eliminating sidewalk gaps. Providing campus connectivity not only improves educational access and transportation efficiency but also enhances community engagement, stimulates economic development, and fosters a more vibrant and sustainable region.

#### Woodsfield SR 78 Multi-Use Path, Woodsfield in Monroe County

Total Project Cost – \$1,236,000 Total RTPO Funds in Project - \$200,000 Total Leveraged Investment - \$1,036,000 Project Partners and/or Collaborators - Monroe County Transportation Improvement District (TID), Monroe County Engineer, Village of Woodsfield, BHRC RTPO, ODOT District 10

This project will connect multiple housing developments and residential areas to the business area on the North side of State Route 78. Multiuse paths are crucial in promoting sustainable, active lifestyles while fostering economic growth, environmental stewardship, and community well-being.

Total Project Cost – \$302,070.33

Project Partners/Collaborators—City of Lancaster, Destination Downtown Lancaster, Fairfield Heritage Trail Association & CORPO

The Lancaster Southern Gateway project supported economic development and small businesses, as well as improved conditions for residents in downtown Lancaster. It also increases connectivity to the Lancaster Bike Path from the downtown area and was the first dedicated bicycle lane in the city. The project also fostered community collaboration and laid the groundwork for additional pedestrian improvement projects in downtown Lancaster and throughout the CORPO region.

# Rosette Way to Healthy Food, SR 47 within the Village of Richwood in Union County

Total Project Cost - \$137,572.00

Total RTPO Funds in Project - \$28,249.60

Total Leveraged Investment – \$7,000 in local match funds plus leveraged Carbon Reduction and HSIP funding

Project Partners/Collaborators – Union County Health Department Creating Healthy Communities Program, the Village of Richwood & CORPO

This project provided a pedestrian connection to the Village of Richwood Farmers Market for Richwood residents that otherwise didn't have access to a grocery store or fresh produce. This project was originally awarded additional RTPO STBG funds, however, they were able to receive additional funding to leverage through HSIP and carbon reduction funding and ultimately some of their remaining funding was able to be carried forward to the SFY 2024-2025 RTPO STBG round.

# State Route 13 Relocation (CR 506, MR 307, MR 273) in the City of Mount Vernon in Knox County

Total Project Cost - \$15,055,027.70

Total RTPO Funds in Project - \$261,316

Total Leveraged Investment – Several other sources including local funds, Connect4Ohio, and Carbon Reduction funding

Project Partners and/or Collaborators – Knox County Officials, Village of Centerburg, Creating Healthy Communities & CORPO

CORPO staff assisted stakeholders from Knox County, Creating Healthy Communities and the City of Mount Vernon on the SR 13 Relocation project. This project will improve travel time for trucks, improve the connection between downtown Mount Vernon and the surrounding rural areas, and grow to be an important route for economic activity for the city and the region.








TOP: Lancaster Southern Gateway Project

### **Urbana Bike Trail PID 115978** in the City of Urbana

Total Cost of Project – \$718,233.00 Total RTPO Funds in Project – \$115,190.00 Project Partners and/or Collaborators – City of Urbana, ODOT & LUC

This project improves both bike path crossings along a railroad and a busy roadway intersection just north of downtown Urbana. The project was a result of an abbreviated safety study completed by ODOT at the request of the City of Urbana. The completed study was used towards applying for Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) funds. The project specifically focuses on bicycle and pedestrian safety improvements, improving the bike trail crossings with signage, striping, and



flashing beacons. A map of the two crossing locations is included and an image from the engineering plans for the bike path and roadway realignment of Location #2 (N Main St/US Hwy 68 and Fyffe St/Laurel Oak St).

# CR 18 Profile Improvements PID 115979 in Lake and Liberty Townships in Logan County

Total Cost of Project -\$178,934.23 Total RTPO Funds in Project - \$157,642.40 Project Partners and/or Collaborators - Logan County Engineer, ODOT & LUC

This project will improve roadway safety by performing profile improvements on CR 18 to increase the line of sight for vehicles on CR 18 and for vehicles approaching CR 18 from TR 216 and TR 200. The improvements are occurring on roadways just west of the City of



Bellefontaine's largest commercial district. The image provided—from Google Streetview—depicts a dip in the roadway. Keep in mind, the dip is less drastic from the Google Streetview camera which may be 7-8' from the ground, but eye level in a car is approximately 3.5' from the ground.


#### **Urbana Signal Study City of Urbana, Champaign County**

This project inventoried the City of Urbana's traffic signals to identify maintenance needs for their system moving-forward. A map of the traffic signals included from the study to be included in a request for an ODOT grant application is provided; please keep in mind these are some the highest traffic roads in the County where SR 29 and US Hwy 36 come together. Without the traffic signal study, the City could not have completed applications for ODOT's Small City program or the TAP program.

This project will repair a large crack in the pacing and improve access to the existing activity center and employment area.

### **Banner School Road Connection** in Defiance County

The Banner School Road Connection project will remove the hazardous at-grade intersection with US 24.

It supports other modes of travel, freight distribution, and improves the existing employment area.

The compilation of these projects shows the holistic planning approach that our RTPO staff takes to advance transportation throughout the region.



### Riverfront Trail Phase 1.2 in the City of East Liverpool

Total Cost of Project: \$1,750,000

Total Leveraged Investment in Project: \$1,450,000

Total RTPO Funds in Project: \$300,000

Project Partners and/or Collaborators: City of East Liverpool,

Columbiana County & OMEGA

When complete, the East Liverpool Riverfront Trail will be 4.67 miles in length, connecting Downtown East Liverpool to the Pennsylvania state line where it will connect to the proposed Industrial Heartland Trail network of 1,500 miles of trails in four states.

### 3rd Street Bridge / Repair Replacement in Uhrichsville

Total Cost of Project: \$1,896,999

Total Leveraged Investment in Project: \$1,649,090

Total RTPO Funds in Project: \$247,909

Project Partners and/or Collaborators: Village of Uhrichsville and OMEGA

The proposed project will completely remove and replace the deficient span and substructure. A new span will be placed in the same location with new substructure and erosion controls. A temporary at-grade crossing of the railroad at Erie/East Street (for maintenance of traffic) may be needed for access to residences and the village's water plant. The project also includes flexible pavement, drainage improvements, and guardrail.

## Berlin Elementary School Sidewalks in the Village of Berlin

Total Cost of Project: \$702,644

Total Leveraged Investment in Project: \$ 351,322

Project Partners and/or Collaborators: Holmes County, Berlin Township,

Provides a safe alternative transportation means for those walking to school. 
