



## **Testimony of Suzette Heller**

Director of Development, Save A Warrior Before the Ohio House Finance Committee April 2025 – 136th General Assembly

Chairman Stewart, Vice Chair Dovilla, Ranking Member Sweeney, and Members of the House Finance Committee:

Good morning and thank you for the opportunity to speak with you today. My name is Suzette Heller, and I serve as the Director of Development for Save A Warrior, headquartered in Hillsboro, Ohio. I'm here today with deep gratitude for the support you've already provided and with a sincere and urgent request to reconsider the current allocation for Save A Warrior in the proposed state budget.

As it stands, the proposal is for \$125,000 per year for our program. I am respectfully submitting a counter-offer of \$250,000 per year, specifically dedicated to saving the lives of Ohio's First Responders.

Let me tell you why this matters:

In 2023, we served 56 Ohio First Responders at a cost of \$280,000. In addition, 24 Veterans who were also First Responders came through our program—80 total First Responders **served** in that year alone.

In 2024, we served 52 First Responders, along with 40 who were also Veterans, totaling 92 First Responders at a cost of \$260,000.

Thankfully for Save A Warrior, the Disabled American Veterans Charitable Services Trust grants our organization \$1M annually to help take care of our Veteran population. Their name is proudly displayed on the National Center of Excellence for Complex Post-traumatic Stress at S/SG Dick Wood Warrior Village. That should tell you we are doing something right.

For the past two years, the Ohio Association of Professional Fire Fighters has provided \$62,000 annually from their member dues to support this work. We also received \$150,000 per year through a bi-annual grant from the **Ohio Department of Mental Health**. That support has been invaluable. But the **funding gap remains real**, and it is growing.

We are not a nice-to-have line item in the budget—we are a **life-saving intervention**. What differentiates our program is this:

To date, we have not lost a single Ohio First Responder to suicide who has come through Save A Warrior.

Let me say that again: We haven't lost one.

Law enforcement and firefighters are more likely to die by suicide than in the line of duty and the traditional medical model is failing them. The men and women who come to us, the majority, are **actively suicidal** and they cannot speak up. They fear losing their badge, their gun, their livelihood—and the shame of having to explain that to their family.

Our First Responders often work grueling 8 to 24-hour shifts. When a critical incident occurs—especially early in a shift—they are expected to push through the remaining hours with composure and professionalism, all while suppressing the emotional impact of what just happened. There's no time to pause, no space to process. In some cases, the responder may even be isolated from their team due to the nature of the incident, which only deepens the anxiety and disconnection they feel.

At Save A Warrior, we teach a new way of being—a radically different way to live. Our program gives First Responders access to a world they never thought possible: one where transformation is not only possible, but sustainable. A transformed human being can learn to recognize a traumatic incident, name it for what it is, and release it—rather than carrying it silently and indefinitely. With this new way of seeing and listening, moments of isolation are no longer sources of panic. Instead of anxiety, they may find stillness. Instead of fear, they may turn to meditation. And from that space, healing begins.


First Responders are held to a higher standard both **on and off duty**. They can't fall apart at the grocery store. They can't ask for help at work. So, they come to us—quietly, confidentially, and often as a last resort.

And when they leave us? Suicide is off the table.

Chairman Stewart and members of this committee—we are not asking for the moon. We are asking for \$250,000 per year—less than the cost of one average line item in a single agency budget—to save the lives of the very people who save ours.


We understand that difficult choices must be made. But surely, somewhere in this budget, **a less critical line item can be trimmed**. We're not talking about studying rabbit mating habits here. We're talking about First Responders who are out of options—and whose lives are on the line.













The **National Center of Excellence** stands proudly in the great state of Ohio. It is right here. These are **our people.** They deserve better. They **need** better. And we have a chance to give them that—right now.

I have attached to this testimony **anonymous first-hand accounts from First Responders** who have come through our program. I encourage you to read them. They speak more powerfully than I ever could.

This is a largely thankless profession. But this—**this funding**—is how we show appreciation. Not with words. Not with plaques. But with **action**.

Thank you for your time, your consideration, and your leadership.
