Sponsor Testimony – House Bill 386

Wednesday, October 1st, 2025

Representative Cindy Abrams:

Chair Thomas, Vice Chair Swearingen, Ranking Member Synenberg, and members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide sponsor testimony on House Bill 386, which seeks to amend Section 3101.05 of the Ohio Revised Code, which governs the application process for a marriage license.

This commonsense legislation was brought to us by a Probate Judge who works with issuing marriage licenses on a daily basis. Under the current law, applicants are only required to prove their age. While that requirement can be satisfied with a photo identification, it can also be met by presenting documentation without photos, such as a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate. Essentially, there is no statutory requirement that an applicant provide proof of identity.

Representative Odioso:

House Bill 386 addresses this gap in 3101.05 (A)(2) by adding a new provision that requires each applicant to present a current and valid photo identification when applying for a marriage license. Acceptable forms of identification include a U.S. passport, driver's license, state-issued identification card, government-issued photo ID, or a school-issued photo ID.

This is a commonsense update to the Ohio law. Requiring a valid photo identification ensures that probate courts can have a reliable way to verify the identity of applicants, reduce the potential for fraud, and maintain the integrity of the marriage license process. Importantly, the legislation is flexible by allowing multiple forms of photo identification, making compliance straightforward for applicants of all ages.

Lastly, this bill brings our marriage license procedures in line with modern identification standards already used in most other legal and civic processes. This will close the loophole that currently permits the issuance of marriage licenses without a reliable means of confirming identity.

Members of the House Judiciary Committee, this is a simple yet important step to ensure greater accuracy and accountability in Ohio's marriage license system. We respectfully ask for your consideration of House Bill 386.
