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Subject: Strong Opposition to Senate Bill 1/House Bill 6 – Protect Faculty Rights, Collective Bargaining, and Students

I am writing as a concerned faculty member at Columbus State Community College and a member of the Columbus State Education Association to strongly oppose **House Bill 6 (HB6)**. This bill **undermines collective bargaining rights, limits academic freedom, and imposes rigid faculty workload and evaluation policies** without regard for the needs of students, faculty, or institutions of higher education. But it isn't just professors who will be impacted. Should this unpopular bill become law, its long-term effects will devastate our state economically in the future – impacting every single Ohioan.

This legislation is unfounded. The idea that Ohio professors are "brainwashing" students or limiting their right to free thought is patently absurd. If this were true, then how did so many well-known Republicans – such as Jim Jordan, Frank LaRose, Dave Yost, Keith Faber, and even Vice President JD Vance – graduate from Ohio colleges?

This legislation is widely unpopular. Over 850 Ohioans submitted testimony in opposition to SB1, while only 14 testified in favor of it. In other words, 98% of Ohioans said "NO" to this bill. Since it passed the Senate, there have been well-attended protests both on and off college campuses across the state.

This legislation will devastate Ohio's economy. If this bill becomes law, the higher education programs of at least two dozen professions will be at risk. Licensing and certification exams require these topics – climate policies, electoral politics, foreign policy, cultural competency, abortion, and more. Without this content, Ohio's programs will no longer be viable. The professions themselves will struggle and fold. Examples include:

- Nursing (NCLEX-RN, NCLEX-PN, Advanced Practice Exams): Requires training
 on public health, social determinants of health, and policies affecting medical care
 access.
- Law (Ohio Bar Exam): Lawyers must understand constitutional law, family, law, immigration, and policy-related legal frameworks.

- Medicine (USMLE, COMLEX, Ohio Medical Board Licensing): Physicians need education on public health policies, environmental health, and medical ethics.
- **Public Health (CHES, CPH):** Professionals require an understanding of how polices affect healthcare and epidemiology.
- **Pharmacology:** Currently required to take cultural competency classes, legislative and regulatory policy, and women's health knowledge (including abortion medications).
- Social Work (LISW, LSW): Requires knowledge of public policies, family structures, immigration issues, and ethics.

Other impacted fields would include psychology; teaching; environmental science; urban planning; counseling and therapy; criminal justice; public administration; journalism and communications; real estate; business and finance; emergency management; engineering; firefighting and emergency medical services; aviation; library science; international relations and diplomacy; and social and community services.

Any Ohioan pursuing a career or licensure in these fields will be forced to go to another state to complete their required coursework. So unless you would like to live in a state without nurses, doctors, lawyers, or teachers, then you should not allow this devastating bill to become law.

Ohio's higher education system thrives when **faculty have a voice in shaping policies that impact our students' success**. I urge you to **vote against HB6** and instead support policies that respect student needs and faculty expertise, uphold academic freedom, and protect collective bargaining rights.
