Chair Roegner, Vice Chair Gavarone, Ranking Member Blackshear and members of the Senate General Government Committee:

My name is Catherine M. Manzo and I am from Rocky River, Ohio. Thank you for the opportunity to testify. I am writing to express my opposition to SB 153.

This bill is overly broad and excessively restrictive of Ohioans civic rights.

This bill attacks the citizen initiative process, making it more difficult and expensive for Ohio citizens to make our voices heard at the ballot box. Currently the process is onerous enough for a citizen driven, all volunteer effort to gather and submitsignatures:

- Be initiated by a petition signed by 1,000 qualified electors.
- Be submitted to both the Secretary of State and Attorney General for review.
- Gather signatures equal to at least 6% of the last gubernatorial vote, with minimums from 44 counties.
- Meet specific formatting and filing requirements with the Secretary of State.

SB 153 makes it harder to register and cast your ballot. This impacts a broad array of Ohioans from rural voters who may struggle to get to a nearby BMV, to married women who have changed their names, to young people. Anyone with a mismatch of information at the BMV and on their voting records is at risk of

having their vote thrown out. This is an unduly restrictive solution to a non-existent problem. More people are struck by lightening in a year (approximately 250) than commit voter fraud (62 cases from 1982-2024 https://electionfraud.heritage.org/search? state=oh).

SB 153 overloads our local Boards of Elections with unfunded mandates and new requirements while giving them zero additional support. This 200+ page bill adds significant new burdens for Boards of Election, including tedious administrative tasks. At the same time, it eliminates drop boxes, which will require more election staff to be available during early vote season to accept and process ballots.

Voting is our most sacred right as citizens of Ohio. Creating roadblocks to the ballot is undemocratic and not what the people of Ohio voted for in the 1851 Ohio Constitution which established a framework for a more democratic and accountable government, with greater power in the hands of the people. This bill has the direct opposite effect.

Please vote no on SB 153.
