Good morning Chair Huffman, Vice Chair Johnson, Ranking Member Liston, and members of the Senate Health Committee. My name is Missy Anthony, Executive Director of the Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, and Athletic Trainers Board. On behalf of the OTPTAT Board members, thank you for the opportunity to testify on the FY 26-27 OTPTAT Board budget as proposed by Governor Mike DeWine.

The mission of the Ohio OTPTAT Board is to actively promote and protect the health of Ohioans through effective regulation of the professions of occupational therapy (OT), physical therapy (PT), athletic training (AT), orthotics, prosthetics, and pedorthics (OPP). This is accomplished through primary tasks of regulation for over 36,000 professionals:

- Establishing and checking requirements for entry into the profession
- Adopting administrative rules based on the Board's statutory authority to increase transparency and create processes for efficient regulation
- Investigating complaints and disciplining license holders for violations of the code of ethics
- Promoting continued competence of licensees through required continuing education

These essential functions are accomplished by a team of ten employees and payroll drives the bulk of the agency's budget (83%). The Board itself is comprised of five members of the Occupational Therapy Section (four OT/one OTA), nine members of the Physical Therapy Section (eight PT/one PTA), five members of Athletic Trainers Section (four AT/one physician), and one public member – for a total of twenty members. The five members of the Ohio Orthotics, Prosthetics, and Pedorthics Advisory Council advise the board on matters related to those professions.

As part of Fund 4K90, the OTPTAT Board's budget is entirely supported by revenue raised through licensure fees and disciplinary fines. The Board respectfully requests spending authority totaling \$1,352,852 in FY 26 and \$1,434,859 in FY 27. This amount will fully support necessary board operations for FY 26-27 biennium, barring any major expenses related to disciplinary hearings or legislative initiatives which require eLicense changes. Payroll and Department of Administrative Services (rent, IT) costs are two of the main components of the

OTPTAT Board budget. The OTPTAT Board uses the Office of Budget and Management's Central Service Agency, which assists boards with many administrative tasks through shared fiscal and human resource services. Based on historical revenue trends, the OTPTAT Board's anticipated revenue in the upcoming biennium will cover the amount requested by the Board in this budget request, as the OTPTAT Board has historically been a net contributor to the 4K90 fund.

## Fiscal Year 24-25 Highlights and Initiatives:

- 1. Issued 2,017 new licenses in Fiscal Year 2024. Licenses are typically issued within 1-2 business days of receipt of a completed application.
- 2. Initiated 112 investigations of violations of the Ohio Revised Code and Ohio Administrative Code in 2024. Investigations result in a myriad of outcomes, ranging from case closure to license revocation.
- 3. Completed a complete reorganization of agency rules. This reorganization eliminated duplication and reduced the number of rules from 169 to 86.
- 4. Continued participation in the Physical Therapy and Occupational Therapy Interstate Licensure Compacts. As of April 4, 2025, there are 366 physical therapists and 58 physical therapist assistants licensed in other states who hold a privilege to practice in Ohio. Additionally, there are 748 physical therapists and 131 physical therapist assistants living in Ohio using the PT Compact to practice across state lines. The OT Compact is planned to go-live later this year. The athletic trainers profession is currently working to draft its own licensure compact.
- 5. Supported awareness of the Board's Safe Haven program partnership with the Ohio Professionals Health Program, which provides resources to licensees to support their wellness. To date, this partnership has provided over 5,000 hours of education on substance use and mental health wellness and has processed 29 referrals.
- 6. Promoted changes to the eLicense Ohio system to begin collecting critical workforce data about licensed professions and to promote efficiencies that reduce human error and processing time for Board staff.

On behalf of the OTPTAT Board, I appreciate thoughtful consideration of the Board's FY 2026-2027 budget request, and I am happy to answer any questions.

## **Historical Trends:**

The OTPTAT Board continues to see growth in all lines of business, as demonstrated by increases in the number of active license holders, meanwhile fees have remained the same as the Board has been able to operationally absorb the growth with existing staffing.
