My partner, who works in education, has shared how this decentralized system fosters innovation and responsiveness to local needs. SB-1 threatens this balance by centralizing authority, which could lead to a one-size-fits-all approach that ignores the unique needs of communities like ours. This bill risks undermining the very system that has made Ohio a leader in cost-effective, high-quality education.

This bill would have far-reaching consequences for communities across Ohio. By consolidating power under the governor, SB-1 removes the ability of local districts, parents, and citizens to influence educational policies that directly affect their children. This shift could disproportionately harm rural and underserved communities, where local input is critical to addressing specific challenges. As someone who values community-driven solutions, I am deeply concerned about the potential erosion of trust and collaboration between educators, families, and policymakers.

I am testifying today because I believe SB-1 poses a significant threat to Ohio's educational system and the communities it serves. I ask that you oppose this bill and vote no, or support amendments that preserve local control and ensure that parents, districts, and citizens retain their ability to shape education policy. Ohio's success in
