I urge you to reconsider the impact of SB 1 and work toward a solution that strengthens Ohio's higher education system while upholding principles of merit, fairness, and academic excellence. Rather than dismantling programs that foster opportunity, let us focus on creating policies that ensure all students have an equal chance to excel based on their talent and effort. This bill does not accomplish that and in a lot ways, prevents students, staff, and faculty from having a fair chance of succeeding.

I ask you to consider my testimony and vote NO on this bill.
