Thank you for allowing me to testify today. My name is Sophie Swengel, and I am an undergraduate at Kent State University studying history and creative writing. I stand opposed to SB 1 and its companion bill HB 6, though I would like to use this space to highlight some of the lesser publicized side effects of this bill. If passed, Senate Bill 1 would remove jobs protections from educators as well as allow colleges and universities to end programs and terminate faculty positions without warning or cause. With my university undergoing numerous complex restructuring processes already; and, having received inside word that it is to cut its PhD program in History, I can't bear to see similar shockwaves to current programs and positions across my campus or otherwise, in my field or otherwise, in the state of Ohio. The bonds I have formed with my professors during my time at Kent State have been innumerable, and such an occupation should be treated with the utmost dignity by the state.

As for the more quote-on-quote 'controversial' aspects of the bill, as a creative minded person familiar with the tactics of subversion and subtlety, I regret to inform you that even if this bill does pass, me and surely many other youngsters across the state will continue functioning as free thinking and free talking individuals.
