What made this education affordable and possible for me was the Morrill Scholarship - a scholarship given to underserved populations; a scholarship that changed my life trajectory and made my college education possible.

Once at Ohio State, I excelled and decided once receiving my BA in History to continue on as Buckeye in graduate school. I received my PhD in U.S. History from Ohio State in 2016 now serve as an Assistant Professor in the Libraries at the University.

My success in academics is a direct result of the strong social connections and institutional support I received from Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion initiatives. These programs considered my unique background and celebrated cultural differences to excite me to engage with the university community and feel supported while discovering my passion for history.
