1.	Are you a graduate of or do any of your dependents attend the institution to which you are being appointed trustee?	a

2. What is your position on the First Amendment rights of faculty, staff, and students, and how will you balance this with promoting diversity of thought on campus?

First Amendment rights should be strongly protected, especially on the campuses of our universities. This is not inherently in conflict with the promotion of diversity of thought, and in fact these rights should affirm and celebrate diversity of thought. Nevertheless, respect for the views of others requires the space and opportunity for sharing diverse points of view. Obstruction, disruption, and censorship wrongfully preclude and interfere with these rights and should be prohibited.

- 3. In your opinion, what are three current significant issues affecting higher education?
- 1. The preservation of studies of humanities and liberal arts while also enabling career and employment links from higher education to the workplace.
- 2. The cost of higher education to the students seeking it.
- 3. Developing more opportunities for the underrepresented to participate in higher education in order to fill the job openings in the region.
- 4. Do you feel comfortable presenting new or alternative solutions to issues presented to the Board of Trustees ("Board") by the president or other trustees of the institution to which you are being appointed?

Yes. I think it's important as we confront challenges at the university and with the workforce that we think "outside the box" for the benefit of the students in our region.

- 5. What are some ideas you plan to propose to reduce the overall cost of higher education?

  By providing different paths to a degree through virtual classes, integrated degrees and certification programs. This will allow student flexibility while reducing the cost of higher education. I am still developing an understanding of other possibilities for cost reduction.
- 6. What thoughts do you have on faculty tenure, post-tenure review, and annual faculty performance reviews? I know there are labor agreements that determine many of the procedures for tenure and post-tenure faculty performance, but none of those should preclude transparency to the students and the community about course content, syllabi, and student evaluations of teacher performance.
- 7. What are your thoughts on ways to increase graduation rates at the institution to which you have been appointed?

Constant, consistent counseling and guidance are critical to increasing graduation rates. We need to review the methods and metrics about what is effective in assisting student performance to degree completion.

On-campus mentoring programs are especially important for first generation students. This is evident in the success rate of those students in the Living, Learning Community Dorm at CSU. Finally, flexible program offerings such as virtual classes and integrated degrees will be important tools to increasing graduation rates at CSU.

8. Is higher education in Ohio addressing the current and future workforce needs of our state, and how can the institution you have been appointed to better address these workforce challenges?

I believe Cleveland area employers and businesses have a good understanding about workforce development. CSU can better address these needs by connecting graduates with local alums who have job openings, targeting student majors to address workforce needs and using our unique "campus in the city" to connect students to internships during their undergraduate years that can lead to full-time employment upon graduation. Deeper collaboration with the business community is important for our economy and our students.

9. In your view, who are you ultimately responsible to serve as a trustee of the institution you have been appointed to: the president, Board chairperson, or taxpayers of Ohio?

The ultimate responsibility is to the students and the taxpayers of Ohio. It's important that Board members work collaboratively with fellow board members, the administration of the university and our state elected officials to insure that we're living up to this responsibility.
