*Joint-Sponsor Testimony, House Bill 31*  
*November 18<sup>th</sup>, 2025*

Good morning, Chairman Manning, Vice-Chair Reynolds, Ranking Member Hicks-Hudson, and all of the other members on the Senate Judiciary Committee. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to provide sponsor testimony in favor of House Bill 31, which will require the electronic recordings of parole board hearings and make recording requestable.

Currently, Ohio parole board is not required in any capacity to record parole hearings. As of 2022, of which is the most current data, roughly 22,000 Ohioans were under parole, and 191,000 under probation<sup>i</sup>. With so many parolees, it would make sense to have some kind of recording available for reference. H.B. 31 would fix this and allow any party, person, or entity including the inmate who is the subject of said hearing to request the Department of Rehabilitation and Correction to provide an electronic recording. Additionally, if the party, person, or entity wishes to have a recording transcribed, can do so at their own expense.

It is also important to mention that the electronic recordings of parole hearings will not include the name, date of birth, home or work address, social security number, age, telephone number, electronic mail address, and any other information that is likely to identify the victim or the victim's immediate family.

H.B. 31 passed the House Floor unanimously earlier this General Assembly and I want to thank Representative Humphrey for sticking with this proposed legislation. We hope to see this across the finish line. Thank you again for your time and consideration, and I will now attempt to answer any questions you may have.
