BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That sections 4773.10, 4774.08, and 4774.10 be	6
amended and sections 4723.37, 4773.062, and 4774.101 of the	7
Revised Code be enacted to read as follows:	8
Sec. 4723.37. (A) A registered nurse or licensed practical	9
nurse may administer contrast only under the direct or general	10
<pre>supervision of a physician.</pre>	11
For purposes of this section, both of the following apply	12
to a physician's supervision:	
(1) Direct supervision does not require the supervising	14
physician to observe the administration of contrast, but does	15
require the supervising physician to be present at the location	16
where contrast is administered.	
(2) General supervision does not require the supervising	18
physician to observe the administration of contrast or to be	19

present at the location where contrast is administered, but does	20
require the supervising physician to be readily available for	21
purposes of consulting with and directing the nurse while	22
administering contrast.	23
(B) If a physician provides general supervision of a nurse	24
under this section, then a health care provider that the	25
physician and institution's clinical leadership has determined	26
meets the following qualifications shall be present at the	27
location where the nurse administers contrast, in order to	28
assist the nurse in the event of a reaction to contrast material	29
or other adverse event resulting from contrast administration:	30
(1) The provider received training and meets competency	31
guidelines set by the institution for recognizing, evaluating,	32
diagnosing, and differentiating reactions to contrast material	33
or other adverse events resulting from contrast administration.	34
(2) The provider is able to recognize when medical	35
intervention is required for an immediate, hypersensitive	36
reaction to contrast material or for a physiological adverse	37
event resulting from contrast administration.	38
(3) The provider is able to consult with the supervising	39
physician within an appropriate time frame.	40
(C) When engaging in or supervising contrast	41
administration or when assisting with a reaction to contrast	42
material or other adverse event resulting from contrast	43
administration, the registered nurse, licensed practical nurse,	44
physician, and qualified health care provider shall do so in a	45

guidelines approved by the clinical leadership of the	47

technologist, or nuclear medicine technologist may administer	51
contrast only under the direct or general supervision of a	52

leadership" includes an institution's medical director and	106

When—Except as provided in section 4773.062 of the Revised	108
Code, when engaging in an activity pursuant to a license issued	109
under this chapter to practice as a radiographer or nuclear	110
medicine technologist, the radiographer or nuclear medicine	111
technologist shall do so in a manner that is consistent with a	112
definitive set of treatment guidelines approved by the clinical	113
leadership of the institution at which the radiographer or	114
technologist practices.	115
Sec. 4774.08. (A) A radiologist assistant shall practice	116
only under the supervision of a radiologist acting in accordance	117
with section sections 4774.10 and 4774.101 of the Revised Code.	118
Under this supervision and subject to division (B) of this	119
section, a radiologist assistant may do all of the following:	120
(1) Perform fluoroscopic procedures;	121
(2) Assess and evaluate the physiologic and psychological	122
responsiveness of patients undergoing radiologic procedures;	123
(3) Evaluate image quality, make initial image	124
observations, and communicate observations to the supervising	125
radiologist;	126
(4) Administer contrast media, radio-isotopes, and other	127
drugs prescribed by the supervising radiologist that are	128
directly related to the radiologic procedures being performed;	129
(5) Perform any other radiologic procedures specified by	130
the state medical board in rules adopted under section 4774.11	131
of the Revised Code.	132
(B) A radiologist assistant shall not do any of the	133
following:	134

(1) Interpret radiologic images;	135
(2) Make diagnoses;	136
(3) Prescribe therapies;	137
(4) Administer or participate in the administration of	138
general anesthesia, deep sedation, moderate sedation, or minimal	139
sedation.	140
Sec. 4774.10. (A) To be eligible to supervise a	141
radiologist assistant, a physician shall be actively and	142
directly engaged in the clinical practice of medicine and	143
surgery as a radiologist or actively and directly engaged in the	144
clinical practice of osteopathic medicine and surgery as a	145
radiologist.	146
(B) In providing supervision of a radiologist assistant, a	147
supervising radiologist is subject to all of the following:	148
(1) Except as provided in divisions (B)(2) and (3) of this	149
section and section 4774.101 of the Revised Code, the	150
supervising radiologist shall provide on-site supervision of the	151
radiologist assistant. The supervision shall be provided by	152
being physically present in the same location as the radiologist	153
assistant. The provision of on-site supervision does not	154
necessarily require that the supervising radiologist be in the	155
same room as the radiologist assistant. On-site supervision	156
shall be provided when the radiologist assistant performs a	157
radiologic procedure on a patient who is under minimal sedation.	158
(2) When the radiologist assistant performs a radiologic	159
procedure on a patient who is under general anesthesia, deep	160
sedation, or moderate sedation, the supervising radiologist	161
shall provide direct supervision. The supervision shall be	162
provided by being physically present in the same room as the	163

radiologist assistant, with the radiologist assistant in the	164
actual sight of the supervising radiologist when the radiologist	165
assistant is performing the radiologic procedure.	166
(3) In the case of any radiologic procedure that a	167
radiologist assistant is authorized to perform pursuant to	168
division (A)(5) of section 4774.08 of the Revised Code, the	169
supervising radiologist shall provide the level of supervision	170
specified by the state medical board in the rules adopted under	171
section 4774.11 of the Revised Code authorizing the performance	172
of the procedure.	173
(C) The supervising radiologist of a radiologist assistant	174
assumes legal liability for the services provided by the	175
radiologist assistant.	176
Sec. 4774.101. (A) When a radiologist assistant	177
administers contrast media as described in division (A)(4) of	178
section 4774.08 of the Revised Code, a supervising radiologist	179
shall provide on-site or remote supervision.	180
For purposes of this section, both of the following apply	181
to a radiologist's supervision:	182
(1) On-site supervision does not require the supervising	183
radiologist to be in the same room as the radiologist assistant	184
during the administration of contrast media, but does require	185
the supervising radiologist to be physically present at the same	186
location where contrast media is administered.	187
(2) Remote supervision does not require the supervising	188
radiologist to be physically present in the same room or	189
location as the radiologist assistant during the administration	190
of contrast media, but does require the supervising radiologist	191
to be readily available for purposes of consulting with and	192

directing the radiologist assistant while administering contrast	193
<pre>media.</pre>	194
(B) If a supervising radiologist provides remote	195
supervision of a radiologist assistant, then a health care	196
provider that the radiologist and institution's clinical	197
leadership has determined meets the following qualifications	198
shall be present at the same location where the radiologist	199
assistant administers contrast media, in order to assist the	200
radiologist assistant in the event of a reaction to contrast	201
media or other adverse event resulting from contrast media	202
administration:	203
(1) The provider received training and meets competency	204
guidelines set by the institution for recognizing, evaluating,	205
diagnosing, and differentiating reactions to contrast media and	206
other adverse events resulting from contrast media	207
administration.	208
(2) The provider is able to recognize when medical	209
intervention is required for an immediate, hypersensitive	210
reaction to contrast media or for a physiological adverse event	211
resulting from contrast media administration.	212
(3) The provider is legally authorized to administer	213
prescription drugs and other interventions, either independently	214
or in accordance with a radiologist's standing order or	215
institutional protocol, to treat a reaction or event described	216
in division (B)(2) of this section.	217
(4) The provider is able to consult with the supervising	218
radiologist within an appropriate time frame.	219
(5) The provider is certified in basic life support by an	220
organization acceptable to the institution.	221

(6) The provider understands when to call for assistance	222
and how to activate emergency response systems.	223
(C) When engaging in or supervising contrast media	224
administration or when assisting with a reaction to contrast	225
media or other adverse event resulting from contrast media	226
administration, the radiologist assistant, supervising	227
radiologist, and qualified health care provider shall do so in a	228
manner that is consistent with a definitive set of treatment	229
guidelines approved by the clinical leadership of the	230
institution at which the assistant, radiologist, and qualified	231
health care provider practice.	232
Section 2. That existing sections 4773.10, 4774.08, and	233
4774.10 of the Revised Code are hereby repealed.	234
