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### SUMMARY

- Permits a school district that offers a Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) or National Defense Cadet Corps (NDCC) program to designate that program as part of the district's career-technical education (CTE) program.
- Requires the Department of Education and Workforce to include in the calculation of a school district's CTE funding any JROTC or NDCC program a district designates as part of its CTE program.

### DETAILED ANALYSIS

#### JROTC and NDCC as career-technical education

The bill permits a school district that offers a Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) program approved by the U.S. Congress or a National Defense Cadet Corps (NDCC) program approved by a military department secretary of the U.S. armed forces to designate that program as part of the district's career-technical education (CTE) program.<sup>1</sup>

The bill requires the Department of Education and Workforce to include in the calculation of a school district's CTE funding any JROTC or NDCC program a district designates as part of its CTE program. The Department must determine in which CTE category to include a JROTC or NDCC program.<sup>2</sup>

#### Background

State law requires each city, local, and exempted village school district to provide CTE to students in grades 7-12. The public school financing system provides additional funding to cover

the higher costs of such CTE services. To qualify for state funding, CTE programs must be approved by both the “lead district” (i.e., the district designated by the Department to provide primary CTE leadership within a career-technical planning district composed of a group of districts and other public schools) and the Department. The school financing system calculates CTE funding by separating CTE students into five categories based on the CTE program type and funds a weighted amount for each category.<sup>3</sup>
