A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF OHIO (THE SENATE CONCURRING):

WHEREAS, IN 1833, Virginia slavenoider John Randoiph died	3
and thereby, through his will, freed his slaves from bondage;	4
and	5
WHEREAS, Randolph's former slaves, a group of 383 persons	6
known now as the Randolph Freedpeople, ultimately secured their	7
emancipation after a thirteen-year long legal battle over John	8
Randolph's will; and	9
WHEREAS, In June 1846, The Randolph Freedpeople began their	10
journey north from Virginia, primarily by foot, to 3,200 acres	11
of land in Ohio, which had been purchased for their settlement;	12
and	13
WHEREAS, Community leaders and elected officials in Ohio,	14
hearing of the approach of the Randolph Freedpeople, passed a	15
resolution stating their refusal to live among African Americans	16
and their intent to violently resist the settlement of African	17
Americans: and	1.8

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WHEREAS, The Randolph Freedpeople were prevented from	19
settling on their purchased land by an armed white mob and	20
forced, for fear of their lives, to settle elsewhere in western	21
Ohio; and	22
WHEREAS, Though dispossessed of their land and forced to	23
start their new lives from nothing, the Randolph Freedpeople	24
made significant contributions to the cultural, social,	25
political, and economic fabric of the areas of Ohio they	26
eventually settled and the state as a whole; and	27
WHEREAS, Despite the severe injustice inflicted upon the	28
Randolph Freedpeople, the State of Ohio failed to intervene on	29
their behalf; and	30
WHEREAS, Despite Ohio's status as a "free" state, by the	31
enactment and operation of Ohio's "Black Laws," racial	32
discrimination and racist restrictions on the rights of African	33
Americans were official state policy at the time the Randolph	34
Freedpeople came to Ohio; and	35
WHEREAS, The State of Ohio has never officially recognized	36
or apologized for its role, by action and inaction, in	37
encouraging, supporting, and condoning the unlawful displacement	38
of the Randolph Freedpeople; and	39
WHEREAS, Slavery and the legal framework that supported it,	40
including Ohio's Black Laws, left a legacy of racial mistrust	41
and prejudice that continues to affect Ohioans to this day,	42
including the descendants of the Randolph Freedpeople, whose	43
ancestors never received the justice they deserved; and	44
WHEREAS, The United States Congress has previously passed	45
resolutions apologizing for the enslavement and segregation of	46
African Americans, demonstrating how the recognition of wrongs	47
committed in the past is crucial for racial reconciliation and	48
provides the opportunity to reaffirm our commitment to a just	49

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future and a more perfect Union; now therefore be it	50
RESOLVED, That we, the members of the 136th General	51
Assembly of the State of Ohio, acknowledge, condemn, and	52
apologize for the violent and wrongful acts committed against	53
the Randolph Freedpeople when they were forced off their land;	54
and be it further	55
RESOLVED, That we recognize the Randolph Freedpeople's many	56
valuable contributions to the land they settled, our state, and	57
our country, and honor their perseverance, in the face of great	58
adversity, to live free; and be it further	59
RESOLVED, That we reaffirm the commitment of the State of	60
Ohio to treat all persons with equal respect and fairness; and	61
be it further	62
RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the House of Representatives	63
transmit duly authenticated copies of this resolution to the	64
news media of Ohio.	65
