## Bill Analysis

### SUMMARY

- Increases the penalty for unlawful transactions in weapons when the offense involves the failure to report any lost or stolen firearm or dangerous ordnance from a fourth degree misdemeanor to a first degree misdemeanor.
- Modifies the culpable mental state required to commit that offense from “knowingly” to “recklessly.”

### DETAILED ANALYSIS

#### Unlawful transactions in weapons

##### Failure to report a lost or stolen firearm

Under current law, the offense of unlawful transactions in weapons prohibits, in part, a person from knowingly failing to report the loss or theft of any firearm or dangerous ordnance in a person’s possession or under a person’s control to law enforcement authorities. The penalty is a fourth degree misdemeanor. The bill increases the penalty to a first degree misdemeanor.<sup>1</sup>

The bill also changes the culpable mental state required to commit the offense from “knowingly” to “recklessly.” Under continuing law, a person acts “knowingly” when the person is aware that the person’s conduct will probably cause a certain result or will probably be of a certain nature. A person acts “recklessly” when, with heedless indifference to the consequences, the person disregards a substantial and unjustifiable risk that the person’s conduct is likely to cause a certain result or is likely to be of a certain nature.<sup>2</sup>
