

## **Opponent Testimony on SB 168**

Chair Hoagland, and members of the committee, thank you for allowing me to present this testimony in opposition to SB 168.

I am a resident, homeowner and voter in Stark County, Ohio. No one has more concern for the safety of Ohio's students than Ohio's parents and teachers themselves. But the American Federation of Teachers and the National Education Association both oppose arming staff in schools. (2) The US government's chief legal, educational and law enforcement agencies all find that arming civilians in schools is "not a safe security practice". (3)

The idea that more "Good Guys" with guns will stop shootings by "Bad Guys" has been resoundingly debunked by research. We have 400 million guns in this country but we lead the world in gun deaths! Our gun deaths continue to climb at alarming rates *especially here in Ohio*.

If some schools DO decide to have armed officers in schools, they should have extensive training similar to the Peace Officer training required by current Ohio law. The problem with SB 168 is that it gives voters no idea about how much training School Safety Designees will have. While I appreciate that at least the Police Officer Training Commission would be consulted, there's no guarantee how much training will actually be required. It could be something far less than Ohio voters would be satisfied with. And many voters do not want ANY guns in schools! So with this bill, there would be no opportunity for community input as to this issue. According to the New York City Police Department, their officer's ability to shoot accurately decreases significantly when engaged in gunfights with perpetrators. (9) If training is significantly lower than what is currently required by Ohio law, our children will be at even more risk.

I urge you to reject SB 168.
