## A BILL

То	amend section 9.15 and to enact section 5101.75	1
	of the Revised Code to require that, under	2
	certain circumstances, the Department of Job and	3
	Family Services pay funeral, cremation,	4
	cemetery, and burial expenses of deceased	5
	recipients of public assistance.	6

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That section 9.15 be amended and section	7
5101.75 of the Revised Code be enacted to read as follows:	8
Sec. 9.15. When the body of a dead person is found in a	9
township or municipal corporation, and such person was not an	10
inmate of a correctional, benevolent, or charitable institution	11
of this state, and the body is not claimed by any person for	12
private interment or cremation at the person's own expense, $rac{\partial r}{\partial r}$	13
delivered for the purpose of medical or surgical study or	14
dissection in accordance with section 1713.34 of the Revised	15
Code, or the person was not eligible for burial assistance under	16
section 5101.75 of the Revised Code, it shall be disposed of as	17
follows:	18

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(A) If the person was a legal resident of the county, the
proper officers of the township or municipal corporation in
which the person's body was found shall cause it to be buried or
cremated at the expense of the township or municipal corporation
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in which the person had a legal residence at the time of death.

(B) If the person had a legal residence in any other
county of the state at the time of death, the superintendent of
the county home of the county in which such body was found shall
cause it to be buried or cremated at the expense of the township
or municipal corporation in which the person had a legal
residence at the time of death.

(C) If the person was an inmate of a correctional
30 institution of the county or a patient or resident of a
31 benevolent institution of the county, the person had no legal
32 residence in the state, or the person's legal residence is
33 unknown, the superintendent shall cause the person to be buried
34 or cremated at the expense of the county.

Such officials shall provide, at the grave of the person or, if the person's cremated remains are buried, at the grave of the person's cremated remains, a metal, stone, or concrete marker on which the person's name and age, if known, and date of death shall be inscribed.

A political subdivision is not relieved of its duty to 41 bury or cremate a person at its expense under this section when 42 the body is claimed by an indigent person. As used in this 43 section, "indigent person" means a person whose income does not 44 exceed one hundred fifty per cent of the federal poverty line, 45 as revised annually by the United States department of health 46 and human services in accordance with section 673(2) of the 47 "Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981," 95 Stat. 511, 42 48

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U.S.C. 9902, as amended, for a family size equal to the size of	49
the person's family.	50
Sec. 5101.75. (A) This section applies to funeral,	51
cremation, cemetery, and burial expenses for any of the	52
following deceased individuals:	53
(1) The deceased individual was a recipient of	54
supplemental security income for the aged, blind, and disabled	55
under 42 U.S.C. 1381 et seq., as amended, or would have been	56
eligible for this aid except that the deceased individual was a	57
resident of a county home.	58
(2) The deceased individual was a recipient in December_	59
1973 under a former program for the aged, disabled, or blind	60
that was codified under former Chapter 5105., 5106., or 5151. of	61
the Revised Code.	62
(3) The deceased individual resided in any unincorporated	63
area and was a recipient of aid under the Ohio works first	64
program under Chapter 5107. of the Revised Code or the	65
disability financial assistance program under Chapter 5115. of	66
the Revised Code.	67
(B) A person who desires to receive payment for the	68
funeral, cremation, cemetery, and burial expenses of a deceased	69
individual under this section may apply to a county department	70
of job and family services for financial assistance. The	71
application shall include all of the following:	72
(1) An itemized statement of the total funeral, cremation,	73
cemetery, and burial charges, as invoiced by a funeral director;	74
(2) An accounting of any funds the deceased individual had	75
available at the time of death for funeral, cremation, cemetery,	76
and burial charges;	77

(3) A quotation of any insurance the deceased individual	78	
had at the time of death, the proceeds of which can be applied		
to defray funeral, cremation, cemetery, and burial expenses; and	80	
(4) An itemization of the value of any grave space or the	81	
amount of any monetary gifts or grants provided under this	82	
section.	83	
(C) Any person or governmental entity, other than the	84	
state department of job and family services, may provide grave	85	
space and monetary gifts or grants for the funeral, cremation,	86	
cemetery, and burial expenses of an individual to whom this	87	
section applies.	88	
(D) The county department shall approve a financial_	89	
assistance payment, to the person whose application for the	90	
assistance is acceptable to the department, for the amount of	91	
the total funeral, cremation, cemetery, and burial charges that	92	
exceed the funds the deceased individual had available at the	93	
time of death for funeral, cremation, cemetery, and burial	94	
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expenses; the value of insurance the deceased individual had at	95	
the time of death, the proceeds of which can be used to defray		
funeral, cremation, cemetery, and burial expenses; and the value	97	
of grave space and the amount of monetary gifts and grants	98	
received under this section. The financial assistance payment	99	
shall not exceed seven hundred fifty dollars. If, however, the	100	
deceased individual had not reached eleven years of age, had	101	
resided in an unincorporated area, and was the recipient of aid	102	
under the Ohio works first program or the disability financial	103	
assistance program, the financial assistance payment shall not	104	
exceed five hundred dollars.	105
