	Code to authorize a law enforcement officer to	2
	purchase a police dog or horse for fair market	3
	value when the officer retires in good standing	4
	from a law enforcement agency and certain	5
	conditions are met, and to declare an emergency.	6

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That sections 9.62 and 721.15 of the Revised	7
Code be amended to read as follows:	8
Sec. 9.62. (A) As used in this section:	9
(1) "Police dog or horse" means a dog or horse that has	10
been trained, and may be used, to assist law enforcement	11
officers in the performance of their official duties.	12
(2) "Law enforcement agency" means an organization or unit	13
made up of law enforcement officers as defined in section	14
2901.01 of the Revised Code.	15
(B) Upon the disbanding of the canine or equine unit of a	16

law enforcement agency, the agency shall give the law	17	
enforcement officer to whom a police dog or horse is assigned	18	
the first chance to purchase the animal, for one dollar. An		
officer who purchases an animal under this section shall assume		
all responsibility for the animal thereafter.	21	
(C) If a police dog or horse is injured in the line of	22	
duty, becomes disabled and is unfit for duty, or grows too old	23	
to be fit for duty, the law enforcement officer to whom the	24	
animal is assigned may purchase the animal, for one dollar. If	25	
an officer chooses not to purchase an animal as authorized by	26	
this division or division (B) of this section, the disposition	27	
of the animal shall be as otherwise provided by law.	28	
(D) -A Except as provided in division (E) of this section,	29

(E) Notwithstanding section 721.15 of the Revised Code or	34

Sec. 721.15. (A) Personal property not needed for	48
municipal purposes, the estimated value of which is less than	49
one thousand dollars, may be sold by the board or officer having	
supervision or management of that property. If <u>Except as</u>	
provided in section 9.62 of the Revised Code, if the estimated	
value of that property is one thousand dollars or more, it shall	53
be sold only when authorized by an ordinance of the legislative	
authority of the municipal corporation and approved by the	55
board, officer, or director having supervision or management of	56
that property. When so authorized, the board, officer, or	57
director shall make a written contract with the highest and best	58
bidder after advertisement for not less than two nor more than	
four consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation	
within the municipal corporation or as provided in section 7.16	
of the Revised Code, or with a board of county commissioners	
upon such lawful terms as are agreed upon, as provided by	
division (B)(1) of section 721.27 of the Revised Code.	64
(B) When the legislative authority finds, by resolution,	65
that the municipal corporation has vehicles, equipment, or	66
machinery which is obsolete, or is not needed or is unfit for	67
public use, that the municipal corporation has need of other	68
vehicles, equipment, or machinery of the same type, and that it	69
will be in the best interest of the municipal corporation that	70
the sale of obsolete, unneeded, or unfit vehicles, equipment, or	71
machinery be made simultaneously with the purchase of the new	72

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vehicles, equipment, or machinery of the same type, the

officer, or director of the municipal corporation having

supervision or management of the property to offer to sell,

legislative authority may offer to sell, or authorize a board,

those vehicles, equipment, or machinery and to have the selling	77
price credited against the purchase price of other vehicles,	78
equipment, or machinery and to consummate the sale and purchase	79
by a single contract with the lowest and best bidder to be	80
determined by subtracting from the selling price of the	81
vehicles, equipment, or machinery to be purchased by the	82
municipal corporation the purchase price offered for the	83
municipally-owned vehicles, equipment, or machinery. When the	84
legislative authority or the authorized board, officer, or	85
director of a municipal corporation advertises for bids for the	86
sale of new vehicles, equipment, or machinery to the municipal	87
corporation, they may include in the same advertisement a notice	88
of willingness to accept bids for the purchase of municipally-	89
owned vehicles, equipment, or machinery which is obsolete, or is	90
not needed or is unfit for public use, and to have the amount of	91
those bids subtracted from the selling price as a means of	92
determining the lowest and best bidder.	93

- (C) If the legislative authority of the municipal 94 corporation determines that municipal personal property is not 95 needed for public use, or is obsolete or unfit for the use for 96 which it was acquired, and that the property has no value, the 97 legislative authority may discard or salvage that property. 98
- 99 (D) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in division (A) or (B) of this section and regardless of the property's 100 value, the legislative authority of a municipal corporation may 101 sell personal property, including motor vehicles acquired for 102 the use of municipal officers and departments, and road 103 machinery, equipment, tools, or supplies, which is not needed 104 for public use, or is obsolete or unfit for the use for which it 105 was acquired, by internet auction. The legislative authority 106 shall adopt, during each calendar year, a resolution expressing 107

its intent to sell that property by internet auction. The	108
resolution shall include a description of how the auctions will	109
be conducted and shall specify the number of days for bidding on	110
the property, which shall be no less than ten days, including	111
Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays. The resolution shall	112
indicate whether the municipal corporation will conduct the	113
auction or the legislative authority will contract with a	114
representative to conduct the auction and shall establish the	115
general terms and conditions of sale. If a representative is	116
known when the resolution is adopted, the resolution shall	117
provide contact information such as the representative's name,	118
address, and telephone number.	119

After adoption of the resolution, the legislative 120 authority shall publish, in a newspaper of general circulation 121 in the municipal corporation or as provided in section 7.16 of 122 the Revised Code, notice of its intent to sell unneeded, 123 obsolete, or unfit municipal personal property by internet 124 auction. The notice shall include a summary of the information 125 provided in the resolution and shall be published twice. The 126 second notice shall be published not less than ten nor more than 127 twenty days after the previous notice. A similar notice also 128 shall be posted continually throughout the calendar year in a 129 conspicuous place in the offices of the village clerk or city 130 auditor, and the legislative authority. If the municipal 131 corporation maintains a web site on the internet, the notice 132 shall be posted continually throughout the calendar year at that 133 web site. 134

When the property is to be sold by internet auction, the legislative authority or its representative may establish a last minimum price that will be accepted for specific items and may last establish any other terms and conditions for the particular last

sale, including requirements for pick-up or delivery, method of	139
payment, and sales tax. This type of information shall be	140
provided on the internet at the time of the auction and may be	141
provided before that time upon request after the terms and	142
conditions have been determined by the legislative authority or	
its representative.	144
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Section 2. That existing sections 9.62 and 721.15 of the	145
Revised Code are hereby repealed.	
Section 3. This act is hereby declared to be an emergency	147
measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public	
peace, health, and safety. The reason for such necessity is that	149
procedures are necessary to provide for the proper disposition	150
of a police dog or horse upon the retirement of the public	151
safety officer to which that dog or horse is assigned.	152
Therefore, this act shall go into immediate effect.	153
