Chair Blessing III, Vice Chair Reineke, ranking minority member Clyde, and the members of the House Government Accountability and Oversight Committee,

I am Council Member Nick Komives from Toledo, Ohio, and I am writing to you in support of HB 160. Here in Toledo, we have had protections for all people on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity and expression since 1998, which made Toledo the first city in Ohio to do so. Since implementing the ordinance, I can assure you that many of the typical myths surrounding nondiscrimination protections for all people have simply not come to fruition.

Our Human Rights Ordinance has served as a means to protect people from discrimination in our area. It is, indeed, one of the reasons that people like business owner Dennis Lange keeps his business, Pumpernickel's Deli, in Toledo. I became an elected official in order to help foster fairness and equity. One way is through making Toledo a city that is "open for business." It is my sincere hope that you support HB 160 and help to make an Ohio that is "open for business" for all.
