A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

T'O	urge the United States Congress, the Attorney General	Τ

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF OHIO (THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING):

WHEREAS, Cannabis, also known as marijuana, is a plant

comprised of more than eighty active chemical components.	6
According to the National Cancer Institute, these chemical	7
components, or cannabinoids, activate specific receptors found	8
throughout the body to produce pharmacologic effects,	9
particularly in the immune system and central nervous system;	10
and	11
WHEREAS, Scientific research has shown cannabis and its	12
derivatives to have a range of effects that may be	
therapeutically useful, including in the treatment of epilepsy,	
glaucoma, post-traumatic stress disorder, cancer, fibromyalgia,	
multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's disease, and amyotrophic lateral	16
sclerosis; however, rigorous clinical studies are still needed	17
to evaluate the effectiveness of cannabis in treating these and	
other serious medical conditions; and	

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WHEREAS, At least twenty-nine states, including Ohio, as	20
well as the District of Columbia, allow for comprehensive public	21
medical marijuana and cannabis programs, indicating that their	22
citizens believe that cannabis can safely provide a therapeutic	23
benefit to many patients; and	24
WHEREAS, The federal Controlled Substances Act defines a	25
schedule I controlled substance as a drug that has no currently	26
accepted medical use in treatment, a lack of accepted safety for	27
use under medical supervision, and a high potential for abuse.	28
Federal law presently classifies marijuana, or cannabis, as a	29
schedule I controlled substance. Because of this classification,	30
certain regulatory requirements must be met before clinical	31
research can be conducted on cannabis. For example, a researcher	32
must register with the United States Drug Enforcement	33
Administration in order to be authorized to handle the	34
substance. Also each facility where cannabis is stored or	35
dispensed must hold a separate registration. According to the	36
National Institute on Drug Abuse, these and other regulatory	37
barriers have likely contributed to the lack of well-controlled	38
clinical trials; and	39
WHEREAS, Because cannabis is classified as a schedule I	40
controlled substance, additional barriers exist. For instance,	41
it can be difficult for a patient to obtain health insurance	42
coverage for medical cannabis because the federal Food and Drug	43
Administration has not approved its use. It also can be	44
difficult for a financial institution to both comply with the	45
federal Bank Secrecy Act and provide banking services to a	46
cannabis-related business authorized to operate under state law;	47
now therefore be it	48
RESOLVED, That we, the members of the 132nd General	49
Assembly of the State of Ohio, in adopting this resolution, urge	50

the United States Congress, the Attorney General of the United

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States, and the United States Drug Enforcement Administration to	52
reclassify marijuana, or cannabis, in an effort to ease both the	53
regulatory burdens associated with research on its potential	54
medical benefits and the burdens faced by registered patients	55
and cannabis-related businesses; and be it further	56
RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the Ohio Senate transmit duly	57
authenticated copies of this resolution to the United States	58
Congress, the Attorney General of the United States, the United	59
States Drug Enforcement Administration, and the news media of	
Ohio.	61
