A BILL

То	amend sections 3301.0718 and 3313.60 of the	1
	Revised Code and to amend Sections 265.10 and	2
	265.80 of H.B. 166 of the 133rd General Assembly	3
	to require the State Board of Education to adopt	4
	standards for mental health education, to permit	5
	school districts to include mental health	6
	education in their curriculum, and to make an	7
	appropriation.	8

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That sections 3301.0718 and 3313.60 of the	9
Revised Code be amended to read as follows:	10
Sec. 3301.0718. The (A) Except as provided in division (B)	11
of this section, the state board of education shall not adopt or	12
revise any standards or curriculum in the area of health unless,	13
by concurrent resolution, the standards, curriculum, or	14
revisions are approved by both houses of the general assembly.	15
Before the house of representatives or senate votes on a	16
concurrent resolution approving health standards, curriculum, or	17

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revisions, its standing committee having jurisdiction over	18
education legislation shall conduct at least one public hearing	19
on the standards, curriculum, or revisions.	20
(B) Not later than one year after the effective date of	21
this amendment, the state board shall adopt standards for mental	22
health education in grades pre-kindergarten through twelve. The	23
standards may address mental well-being, depression, anxiety,	24
drug and alcohol abuse, bullying and harassment, trauma, and	25
suicide. Any school district or school may utilize any or all of	26
the standards adopted under this section.	27
Division (A) of this section does not apply to the	28
standards adopted under this division.	29
Sec. 3313.60. Notwithstanding division (D) of section	30
3311.52 of the Revised Code, divisions (A) to (E) of this	31
section do not apply to any cooperative education school	32
district established pursuant to divisions (A) to (C) of section	33
3311.52 of the Revised Code.	34
(A) The board of education of each city, exempted village,	35
and local school district and the board of each cooperative	36
education school district established, pursuant to section	37
3311.521 of the Revised Code, shall prescribe a curriculum for	38
all schools under its control. Except as provided in division	39
(E) of this section, in any such curriculum there shall be	40
included the study of the following subjects:	41
(1) The language arts, including reading, writing,	42
spelling, oral and written English, and literature;	43
(2) Geography, the history of the United States and of	44
Ohio, and national, state, and local government in the United	45
States, including a balanced presentation of the relevant	46

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contributions to society of men and women of African, Mexican,	47
Puerto Rican, and American Indian descent as well as other	48
ethnic and racial groups in Ohio and the United States;	49
(3) Mathematics;	50
(4) Natural science, including instruction in the	51
conservation of natural resources;	52
(5) Health education, which shall include instruction in:	53
(a) The nutritive value of foods, including natural and	54
organically produced foods, the relation of nutrition to health,	55
and the use and effects of food additives;	56
(b) The harmful effects of and legal restrictions against	57
the use of drugs of abuse, alcoholic beverages, and tobacco;	58
(c) Venereal disease education, except that upon written	59
request of the student's parent or guardian, a student shall be	60
excused from taking instruction in venereal disease education;	61
(d) In grades kindergarten through six, instruction in	62
personal safety and assault prevention, except that upon written	63
request of the student's parent or guardian, a student shall be	64
excused from taking instruction in personal safety and assault	65
prevention;	66
(e) In grades seven through twelve, age-appropriate	67
instruction in dating violence prevention education, which shall	68
include instruction in recognizing dating violence warning signs	69
and characteristics of healthy relationships.	70
In order to assist school districts in developing a dating	71
violence prevention education curriculum, the department of	72
education shall provide on its web site links to free curricula	73
addressing dating violence prevention.	74

If the parent or legal guardian of a student less than	75
eighteen years of age submits to the principal of the student's	76
school a written request to examine the dating violence	77
prevention instruction materials used at that school, the	78
principal, within a reasonable period of time after the request	79
is made, shall allow the parent or guardian to examine those	80
materials at that school.	81
(f) Prescription opioid abuse prevention, with an emphasis	82
on the prescription drug epidemic and the connection between	83
prescription opioid abuse and addiction to other drugs, such as	84
heroin;	85
(g) The process of making an anatomical gift under Chapter	86
2108. of the Revised Code, with an emphasis on the life-saving	87
and life-enhancing effects of organ and tissue donation;	88
Health instruction also may include mental health,	89
including mental well-being, depression, anxiety, bullying and	90
harassment, trauma, and suicide.	91
(6) Physical education;	92
(7) The fine arts, including music;	93
(8) First aid, including a training program in	94
cardiopulmonary resuscitation, which shall comply with section	95
3313.6021 of the Revised Code when offered in any of grades nine	96
through twelve, safety, and fire prevention. However, upon	97
written request of the student's parent or guardian, a student	98
shall be excused from taking instruction in cardiopulmonary	99
resuscitation.	100
(B) Except as provided in division (E) of this section,	101
every school or school district shall include in the	102
requirements for promotion from the eighth grade to the ninth	103

grade one year's course of study of American history. A board	104
may waive this requirement for academically accelerated students	105
who, in accordance with procedures adopted by the board, are	106
able to demonstrate mastery of essential concepts and skills of	107
the eighth grade American history course of study.	108
(C) As specified in divisions (B)(6) and (C)(6) of section	109
3313.603 of the Revised Code, except as provided in division (E)	110
of this section, every high school shall include in the	111
requirements for graduation from any curriculum one-half unit	112
each of American history and government.	113
(D) Except as provided in division (E) of this section,	114
basic instruction or demonstrated mastery in geography, United	115
States history, the government of the United States, the	116
government of the state of Ohio, local government in Ohio, the	117
Declaration of Independence, the United States Constitution, and	118
the Constitution of the state of Ohio shall be required before	119
pupils may participate in courses involving the study of social	120
problems, economics, foreign affairs, United Nations, world	121
government, socialism, and communism.	122
(E) For each cooperative education school district	123
established pursuant to section 3311.521 of the Revised Code and	124
each city, exempted village, and local school district that has	125
territory within such a cooperative district, the curriculum	126
adopted pursuant to divisions (A) to (D) of this section shall	127
only include the study of the subjects that apply to the grades	128
operated by each such school district. The curriculums curricula	129
for such schools, when combined, shall provide to each student	130
of these districts all of the subjects required under divisions	131
(A) to (D) of this section.	132

(F) The board of education of any cooperative education

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school district established pursuant to divisions (A) to (C) of	134
section 3311.52 of the Revised Code shall prescribe a curriculum	135
for the subject areas and grade levels offered in any school	136
under its control.	137
(G) Upon the request of any parent or legal guardian of a	138
student, the board of education of any school district shall	139
permit the parent or guardian to promptly examine, with respect	140
to the parent's or guardian's own child:	141
(1) Any survey or questionnaire, prior to its	142
administration to the child;	143
(2) Any textbook, workbook, software, video, or other	144
instructional materials being used by the district in connection	145
with the instruction of the child;	146
(3) Any completed and graded test taken or survey or	147
questionnaire filled out by the child;	148
(4) Copies of the statewide academic standards and each	149
model curriculum developed pursuant to section 3301.079 of the	150
Revised Code, which copies shall be available at all times	151
during school hours in each district school building.	152
Section 2. That existing sections 3301.0718 and 3313.60 of	153
the Revised Code are hereby repealed.	154
Section 3. That Sections 265.10 and 265.80 of H.B. 166 of	155
the 133rd General Assembly be amended to read as follows:	156

section 3313.60 of the Revised Code and providing professional	171
development pertaining to that curriculum. The Superintendent of	172
