I imagine with less training, this will happen more frequently to consumers. With that being said, I have not, nor do I plan to ever let someone who is less trained or given a 'speed quota' service me. I'm a firm believer that people frequent salons for the experience AND results achieved from their stylist. I have seen the horror stories online and in social media where less trained professionals have incorrectly serviced clients and even harmed them, though unintentionally. What many legislators fail to realize is these stylists are using dangerous chemicals and tools that require specific knowledge and training that should be regulated at a school and not passed down via apprenticeships from professionals who may not even remember any of the book at all or have barely passed the licensing exam however many years ago. I also fear that training will become 'watered down.' Clients are rendered extremely vulnerable when receiveing any beauty service. I plead that you strongly consider voting against this bill that poses great harm to the community and consumers of the beauty industry in general.
