As a side note, after the last round of re-districting, Andy's mother, Elsa, who lived a few blocks away from Andy, would question why she could not vote for her son. As it happened, her precinct was given to Representative Edwards, which led her to question Andy's talents as a

All the while, Andy truly stayed a friend. We would talk on the phone every day because I felt that was the best way to do my job. Our conversations were not quick! We would be on the phone for well over an hour sometimes discussing sports, family, and

other current affairs. Only after hanging up would we realize we forgot to talk about what we needed to and would be on the phone again minutes later. When Andy left office our phone calls became less frequent, but still seemed to amount to multiple per week because we genuinely enjoyed each other's company.

The day Andy passed, I was pretty devastated, but I know our Lord had better plans for him. I know he earned his wings because he was a kind man who was not mean-spirited towards practically anyone. He was a man who represented his community out of a sense of duty, and while he was certainly partisan he was always open-minded and did not shy away from an argument because he wanted everyone to seek truth. He was a man who cared deeply about his family (practically all of our conversations involving some anecdote about them) and above all he simply cared about people.

I fully support forever memorializing Andy Thompson by naming this bridge in his honor.
