House Bill 206 Sponsor Testimony House Ways & Means Committee October 15, 2019

Good afternoon Chairman Merrin, Vice Chair LaRe, Ranking Member Rogers, and esteemed members of the Ways & Means Committee. It's my honor to share my testimony with you today as joint sponsor of House Bill 206 with Representative Reggie Stoltzfus.

It is with great pleasure that I get to testify on HB 206, a bill to enhance the fully refundable tax credit for family adoptions. At this moment, I myself have become an adoptive mother to a beautiful baby boy. It's a beautiful thing to adopt a child into your family, but it is not a cheap decision either. The cost of adoption is one of the most difficult aspects of the adoption process for most families. The cost for adopting a child from a non-profit and foster care agencies range from \$10,000 to \$25,000. Those that choose to adopt from a private organization can incur costs reaching upwards of \$50,000. Agency and legal fees, medical expenses, changes to living situation and other circumstances create the cost of adoption.

This is very helpful for a family because it allows them to reinvest money into crucial supplies they will need for the long-term care of their child and family health.

On any given day, more than 15,000 children in Ohio are living with foster families or in another out-of-home placements, such as group homes. Foster care costs the State and Federal government approximately \$18,000 per year per child; totaling \$271 million. My joint-sponsor and I plan to introduce two amendments to this bill that encourages foster care adoptions by increasing the fully refundable credit to the amount of \$10,000. Often time's children in foster care have more needs that need to be met, whether trauma care, mental health counseling, medical check-ups, and more. This refundable credit is necessary to the smooth transition of that child out of foster care and into the home of the adoptive parent.
