

Before the Ohio Senate Energy and Public Utilities Committee Testimony on House Bill 13 November 16, 2020

Chairman Wilson, Vice Chairman McColley, Ranking Minority Member Williams and members of the Ohio Senate Energy and Public Utilities Committee:

I am writing to offer proponent testimony on behalf of the the Columbus Partnership in support of the current version of House Bill 13. This important legislation begins to address the gap in high-speed internet services for 300,000 households across the State of Ohio. The issue of broadband access has been a consistent barrier for our state's competitiveness over the past decade, but it has never been more evident than during a pandemic that has transformed the lives of our citizens and workforce.

The Columbus Partnership is a non-profit, membership-based leadership organization of 75 chairpersons, chief executive officers, and senior executives from the region's leading businesses and institutions.
