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Testimony of John T. McNay, Ph.D.

Members of the Senate Judiciary Committee:

My name is John McNay, and I am President of the Ohio Conference of the American Association of University Professors (AAUP), which represents over 6,000 faculty statewide. I also am a professor of history at the University of Cincinnati.

On behalf of my association, I am submitting this interested party testimony for House Bill 606.

We understand the original intent of this legislation – to hold harmless those essential workers who transmit COVID-19.

However, as we understand the legislation today, HB 606 also would provide qualified immunity to public colleges and universities, shielding them from liability resulting from illness or death as a result of COVID-19. We ask this committee to reexamine those provisions of the bill.

Most Ohio institutions have announced the intent to hold in-person classes for fall semester. We are keenly aware of the budgetary implications of not being on campus. Already we have seen substantial faculty and staff layoffs as a result of the COVID-related financial fallout, and we cannot afford any more.

However, safety at our colleges and universities has to be the top priority, and having face-to-face instruction entails obvious risks. Not every person who will be on campus is a healthy 18 to 22 year old. The nature of living in residence calls, sharing enclosed spaces such as lecture halls, as well as student gatherings on and off campus facilitate a breeding ground for infectious diseases like COVID-19.

The potential for litigation is one of the greatest incentives for administrations to ensure safety to the extent possible and to earn the buy-in of their entire campus communities for the plans to return to campuses. HB 606 would remove that incentive, and we ask this committee to reconsider whether that is the appropriate policy.
