A BILL

To amend sections 3715.87, 3715.871, 3715.872, and	1
3715.873 of the Revised Code to modify the laws	2
governing the drug repository program for	3
donated prescription drugs.	4

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That sections 3715.87, 3715.871, 3715.872, and	5
3715.873 of the Revised Code be amended to read as follows:	6
Sec. 3715.87. (A) As used in this section and in sections	7
3715.871, 3715.872, and 3715.873 of the Revised Code:	8
(1) "Controlled substance" has the same meaning as in	9
section 3719.01 of the Revised Code.	10
(2) "Charitable pharmacy" has the same meaning as in	11
section 3719.811 of the Revised Code.	12
(3) "Health care facility" has the same meaning as in	13
section 1337.11 of the Revised Code.	14
(3) (4) "Hospital" has the same meaning as in section	15
3727.01 of the Revised Code.	16

(4) (5) "Nonprofit clinic" means a charitable nonprofit 17 corporation organized and operated pursuant to Chapter 1702. of 18 the Revised Code, or any charitable organization not organized 19 and not operated for profit, that provides health care services 20 to indigent and uninsured persons $_{L}$ as defined in section 21 2305.234 of the Revised Code, or to underinsured persons, as 22 defined in rules adopted under section 3715.873 of the Revised 23 <u>Code</u>. "Nonprofit clinic" does not include a hospital as defined 24 in section 3727.01 of the Revised Code, a facility licensed 25 under Chapter 3721. of the Revised Code, or a facility that is 26 operated for profit. 27 (5) (6) "Prescription drug" means any drug to which the 28 following applies: 29 (a) Under the "Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act," 52 Stat. 30 1040 (1938), 21 U.S.C.A. 301, as amended, the drug is required 31 to bear a label containing the legend, "Caution: Federal law 32 prohibits dispensing without prescription" or "Caution: Federal 33 law restricts this drug to use by or on the order of a licensed 34 veterinarian" or any similar restrictive statement, or the drug 35

(b) Under Chapter 3715. or 3719. of the Revised Code, the 37 drug may be dispensed only upon a prescription. 38

may be dispensed only upon a prescription.

(B) The state board of pharmacy shall establish a drug
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repository program to accept and dispense prescription drugs
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donated or given for the purpose of being dispensed distributed
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to individuals who are residents of this state and meet
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eligibility standards established in rules adopted by the board
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under section 3715.873 of the Revised Code. Except

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section, all of the following conditions shall apply to the	46

(1) Only drugs in their original sealed and tamper-evident	48
unit dose packaging may be accepted and dispensed distributed;	49
(2) The packaging must be unopened, except that drugs	50
packaged in single unit doses may be accepted and dispensed	51
distributed when the outside packaging is opened if the single	52
unit dose packaging is undisturbed;	53
(3) A drug shall not be accepted or dispensed distributed	54
if there is reason to believe that it is adulterated, as	55
described in section 3715.63 of the Revised Code.	56
(C) (D) Drugs that are not in their original sealed and	57
tamper-evident packaging may be accepted and distributed under	58
the program, subject to rules adopted under section 3715.873 of	59
the Revised Code, if the drugs are included in either of the	60

(1) Orally administered cancer drugs that are not	62
controlled substances and that do not require refrigeration,	63
freezing, or storage at a special temperature may be accepted	64
and dispensed even if not in original sealed and tamper-evident	65
unit dose packaging, subject to rules adopted by the board	66
pursuant to section 3715.873 of the Revised Code;	67
(2) Drugs that are accepted and distributed under the	68
program by a charitable pharmacy or nonprofit clinic, including	69
any such drugs that are orally administered cancer drugs or that	70
may require storage at a special temperature.	71
(D) (E) Subject to the limitations specified in divisions	72
(B) and (C) <u>to</u> (D) of this section, unused drugs dispensed for	73
purposes of <u>for which the cost was covered</u> by the medicaid	74

program may be accepted and dispensed distributed under the drug 75 76 repository program. Sec. 3715.871. (A) Any person, including a pharmacy, drug 77 manufacturer, or health care facility, or any other person or 78 government entity may donate or give prescription drugs to the 79 drug repository program. Any person or government entity may 80 facilitate the donation or gift of drugs to the program. The 81 drugs must Drugs may be donated or given only at a pharmacy, 82 hospital, or nonprofit clinic participating in the program. 83 (B) Any pharmacy, hospital, or nonprofit clinic that 84 elects may elect to participate in the drug repository program 85 and if it meets eligibility criteria for participation in the 86 program, as established in rules adopted by the state board of 87 pharmacy-under section 3715.873 of the Revised Code. 88 Participation in the program by pharmacies, hospitals, and 89 nonprofit clinics is voluntary. Nothing in this or any other 90 section of the Revised Code requires a pharmacy, hospital, or 91 nonprofit clinic to participate in the program. 92 (B)-(C) A pharmacy, hospital, or nonprofit clinic eligible 93 to participate participating in the program shall dispense 94 distribute the drugs donated or given under this section it 95 accepts under the program to individuals who are residents of 96 this state and meet the eligibility standards established in 97 rules adopted by the board under section 3715.873 of the Revised 98

A 106 Regardless of which method of distribution is used, a drug 107 may be dispensed distributed to an eligible individual only by 108 being dispensed by a pharmacist pursuant to a prescription 109 issued by a licensed health professional authorized to prescribe 110 drugs, as defined in section 4729.01 of the Revised Code or by 111 being personally furnished by such a prescriber. A-112 (D) A pharmacy, hospital, or nonprofit clinic that accepts 113 donated or given drugs participating in the program shall comply 114 with all applicable federal laws and laws of this state dealing 115 with storage and distribution of dangerous drugs and shall, in 116 accordance with rules adopted pursuant to <u>under</u> section 3715.873 117 of the Revised Code, inspect all drugs prior to dispensing-118 distributing them to determine that they are not or appear not 119 to be adulterated. The-120 (E) A pharmacy, hospital, or nonprofit clinic 121 participating in the program may charge individuals receiving 122 donated or given drugs a handling fee established in accordance 123 with rules adopted by the board under section 3715.873 of the 124 Revised Code. (2) A pharmacy, hospital, or nonprofit clinic that accepts	155

constitutes willful and wanton misconduct.	160

(3) A health care professional who accepts-or, dispenses, 161 or personally furnishes drugs under the program on behalf of a 162 pharmacy, hospital, or nonprofit clinic <u>participating in the</u> 163 program, and the pharmacy, hospital, or nonprofit clinic that 164 employs or otherwise uses the services of the health care 165 professional, shall not be subject to liability in tort or other 166 civil action for injury, death, or loss to person or property, 167 unless an action or omission of the health care professional, 168 pharmacy, hospital, or nonprofit clinic constitutes willful and 169 wanton misconduct. 170

(4) The state board of pharmacy and the director of health
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shall not be subject to liability in tort or other civil action
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for injury, death, or loss to person or property, unless an
action or omission of the board or director constitutes willful
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and wanton misconduct.

(C) (5) In addition to the civil immunity granted under 176 division (B)(1) of this section, any person, including a 177 pharmacy, drug manufacturer, or health care facility, and any or 178 other person or government entity that donates or gives drugs to 179 180 the program, and any person or government entity that facilitates the donation or gift, shall not be subject to 181 criminal prosecution for the donation, giving, acceptance, or 182 dispensing of drugs matters related to activities that it 183 conducts or another party conducts under the program, unless an 184 action or omission of the person or government entity party that 185 donates, gives, or facilitates the donation or gift of the drugs 186 does not comply with the provisions of this chapter or the rules 187 adopted under it. 188

in the program may charge to drug recipients to cover restocking	243
