A BILL

То	amend section 3301.0712 of the Revised Code to	1
	permit parents or guardians of a high school	2
	student to opt the student out of taking a	3
	nationally standardized college admissions	4
	assessment.	5

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That section 3301.0712 of the Revised Code be	6
amended to read as follows:	7
Sec. 3301.0712. (A) The state board of education, the	8
superintendent of public instruction, and the chancellor of	9
higher education shall develop a system of college and work	
ready assessments as described in division (B) of this section	11
to assess whether each student upon graduating from high school	12
is ready to enter college or the workforce. Beginning with	13
students who enter the ninth grade for the first time on or	14

after July 1, 2014, the system shall replace the Ohio graduation15tests prescribed in division (B)(1) of section 3301.0710 of the16Revised Code as a measure of student academic performance and17one determinant of eligibility for a high school diploma in the18manner prescribed by rule of the state board adopted under19division (D) of this section.20

(B) The college and work ready assessment system shall consist of the following:

(1) Nationally (a) Except as provided in division (B) (1) (b) of this section, nationally standardized assessments that measure college and career readiness and are used for college admission. The assessments shall be selected jointly by the state superintendent and the chancellor, and one of which shall be selected by each school district or school to administer to its students. The assessments prescribed under division (B) (1) of this section shall be administered to all eleventh-grade students in the spring of the school year.

(b) Beginning with students who enter the ninth grade for the first time on or after the first day of July immediately following the effective date of this amendment, the parent or guardian of a student may elect not to have a nationally standardized assessment administered to that student. In that event, the student's school district or school shall not administer the nationally standardized assessment to that student.

(2) (a) Except as provided in division (B) (2) (b) of this section, seven end-of-course examinations, one in each of the areas of English language arts I, English language arts II, science, Algebra I, geometry, American history, and American government. The end-of-course examinations shall be selected

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jointly by the state superintendent and the chancellor in 45 consultation with faculty in the appropriate subject areas at 46 institutions of higher education of the university system of 47 Ohio. Advanced placement examinations and international 48 baccalaureate examinations, as prescribed under section 49 3313.6013 of the Revised Code, in the areas of science, American 50 history, and American government may be used as end-of-course 51 examinations in accordance with division (B)(4)(a)(i) of this 52 section. Final course grades for courses taken under any other 53 advanced standing program, as prescribed under section 3313.6013 54 of the Revised Code, in the areas of science, American history, 55 and American government may be used in lieu of end-of-course 56 examinations in accordance with division (B)(4)(a)(ii) of this 57 section. 58

(b) Beginning with students who enter ninth grade for the first time on or after July 1, 2019, five end-of-course examinations, one in each areas of English language arts II, science, Algebra I, American history, and American government. However, only the end-of-course examinations in English language arts II and Algebra I shall be required for graduation.

The department of education shall, as necessary to 65 implement division (B)(2)(b) of this section, seek a waiver from 66 the United States secretary of education for testing 67 requirements prescribed under federal law to allow for the use 68 and implementation of Algebra I as the primary assessment of 69 high school mathematics. If the department does not receive a 70 waiver under this division, the end-of-course examinations for 71 students described in division (B)(2)(b) of this section also 72 shall include an end-of-course examination in the area of 73 geometry. However, the geometry end-of-course examination shall 74 not be required for graduation. 75

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(3) (a) Not later than July 1, 2013, each school district 76 board of education shall adopt interim end-of-course 77 examinations that comply with the requirements of divisions (B) 78 (3) (b) (i) and (ii) of this section to assess mastery of American 79 history and American government standards adopted under division 80 (A) (1) (b) of section 3301.079 of the Revised Code and the topics 81 required under division (M) of section 3313.603 of the Revised 82 Code. Each high school of the district shall use the interim 83 examinations until the state superintendent and chancellor 84 select end-of-course examinations in American history and 85 American government under division (B) (2) of this section. 86

(b) Not later than July 1, 2014, the state superintendent
 and the chancellor shall select the end-of-course examinations
 and American history and American government.

(i) The end-of-course examinations in American history and
 American government shall require demonstration of mastery of
 the American history and American government content for social
 studies standards adopted under division (A) (1) (b) of section
 3301.079 of the Revised Code and the topics required under
 division (M) of section 3313.603 of the Revised Code.

(ii) At least twenty per cent of the end-of-course
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examination in American government shall address the topics on
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American history and American government described in division
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(M) of section 3313.603 of the Revised Code.
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(4) (a) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this
section, beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, both of the
following shall apply:

(i) If a student is enrolled in an appropriate advancedplacement or international baccalaureate course, that student104

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shall take the advanced placement or international baccalaureate 105 examination in lieu of the science, American history, or 106 American government end-of-course examinations prescribed under 107 division (B)(2) of this section. The state board shall specify 108 the score levels for each advanced placement examination and 109 international baccalaureate examination for purposes of 110 calculating the minimum cumulative performance score that 111 demonstrates the level of academic achievement necessary to earn 112 a high school diploma. 113

114 (ii) If a student is enrolled in an appropriate course under any other advanced standing program, as described in 115 section 3313.6013 of the Revised Code, that student shall not be 116 required to take the science, American history, or American 117 government end-of-course examination, whichever is applicable, 118 prescribed under division (B)(2) of this section. Instead, that 119 student's final course grade shall be used in lieu of the 120 applicable end-of-course examination prescribed under that 121 section. The state superintendent, in consultation with the 122 chancellor, shall adopt guidelines for purposes of calculating 123 the corresponding final course grades that demonstrate the level 124 of academic achievement necessary to earn a high school diploma. 125

Division (B) (4) (a) (ii) of this section shall apply only to126courses for which students receive transcripted credit, as127defined in section 3365.01 of the Revised Code. It shall not128apply to remedial or developmental courses.129

(b) No student shall take a substitute examination or
examination prescribed under division (B) (4) (a) of this section
in place of the end-of-course examinations in English language
arts I, English language arts II, Algebra I, or geometry
prescribed under division (B) (2) of this section.

(c) The state board shall consider additional assessments 135 that may be used, beginning with the 2016-2017 school year, as 136 substitute examinations in lieu of the end-of-course 137 examinations prescribed under division (B)(2) of this section. 138 (5) The state board shall do all of the following: 139 (a) Determine and designate at least five ranges of scores 140 on each of the end-of-course examinations prescribed under 141 division (B)(2) of this section, and substitute examinations 142 prescribed under division (B)(4) of this section. Not later than 143 sixty days after the designation of ranges of scores, the state 144 superintendent, or the state superintendent's designee, shall 145 conduct a public presentation before the standing committees of 146 the house of representatives and the senate that consider 147 primary and secondary education legislation regarding the 148 designated range of scores. Each range of scores shall be 149 considered to demonstrate a level of achievement so that any 150 student attaining a score within such range has achieved one of 151 the following: 1.52 (i) An advanced level of skill; 153 (ii) An accelerated level of skill; 154 (iii) A proficient level of skill; 155 (iv) A basic level of skill; 156 (v) A limited level of skill. 157 (b) Determine a method by which to calculate a cumulative 158 performance score based on the results of a student's end-of-159 course examinations or substitute examinations; 160

(c) Determine the minimum cumulative performance score161that demonstrates the level of academic achievement necessary to162

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earn a high school diploma under division (A)(2) of section 163 3313.618 of the Revised Code. However, the state board shall not 164 determine a new minimum cumulative performance score after the 165 effective date of this amendment October 17, 2019. 166

(d) Develop a table of corresponding score equivalents for
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the end-of-course examinations and substitute examinations in
order to calculate student performance consistently across the
different examinations.

A score of two on an advanced placement examination or a 171 score of two or three on an international baccalaureate 172 examination shall be considered equivalent to a proficient level 173 of skill as specified under division (B)(5)(a)(iii) of this 174 section. 175

(6) (a) A student who meets both of the following
conditions shall not be required to take an end-of-course
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examination:

(i) The student received high school credit prior to July 179
1, 2015, for a course for which the end-of-course examination is 180
prescribed. 181

(ii) The examination was not available for administrationprior to July 1, 2015.183

Receipt of credit for the course described in division (B)184(6) (a) (i) of this section shall satisfy the requirement to take185the end-of-course examination. A student exempted under division186(B) (6) (a) of this section may take the applicable end-of-course187examination at a later date.188

(b) For purposes of determining whether a student who is
exempt from taking an end-of-course examination under division
(B) (6) (a) of this section has attained the cumulative score
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prescribed by division (B)(5)(c) of this section, such student 192 shall select either of the following: 193 (i) The student is considered to have attained a 194 proficient score on the end-of-course examination from which the 195 student is exempt; 196 (ii) The student's final course grade shall be used in 197 lieu of a score on the end-of-course examination from which the 198 student is exempt. 199 The state superintendent, in consultation with the 200 chancellor, shall adopt quidelines for purposes of calculating 201 202 the corresponding final course grades and the minimum cumulative performance score that demonstrates the level of academic 203 achievement necessary to earn a high school diploma. 204 (7) (a) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this 205 section, the state board may replace the algebra I end-of-course 206 examination prescribed under division (B)(2) of this section 207 with an algebra II end-of-course examination, beginning with the 208 2016-2017 school year for students who enter ninth grade on or 209 after July 1, 2016. 210

(b) If the state board replaces the algebra I end-ofcourse examination with an algebra II end-of-course examination
as authorized under division (B)(7)(a) of this section, both of
the following shall apply:

(i) A student who is enrolled in an advanced placement or international baccalaureate course in algebra II shall take the advanced placement or international baccalaureate examination in lieu of the algebra II end-of-course examination.

(ii) A student who is enrolled in an algebra II courseunder any other advanced standing program, as described in220

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section 3313.6013 of the Revised Code, shall not be required to 221 take the algebra II end-of-course examination. Instead, that 222 student's final course grade shall be used in lieu of the 223 224 examination.

(c) If a school district or school utilizes an integrated 225 approach to mathematics instruction, the district or school may 226 do either or both of the following:

(i) Administer an integrated mathematics I end-of-course 228 examination in lieu of the prescribed algebra I end-of-course 229 examination; 230

(ii) Administer an integrated mathematics II end-of-course examination in lieu of the prescribed geometry end-of-course examination.

(8) (a) For students entering the ninth grade for the first time on or after July 1, 2014, but prior to July 1, 2015, the assessment in the area of science shall be physical science or biology. For students entering the ninth grade for the first time on or after July 1, 2015, the assessment in the area of science shall be biology.

(b) Until July 1, 2019, the department shall make 240 available the end-of-course examination in physical science for 241 students who entered the ninth grade for the first time on or 242 after July 1, 2014, but prior to July 1, 2015, and who wish to 243 retake the examination. 244

(c) Not later than July 1, 2016, the state board shall 245 adopt rules prescribing the requirements for the end-of-course 246 examination in science for students who entered the ninth grade 247 for the first time on or after July 1, 2014, but prior to July 248 1, 2015, and who have not met the requirement prescribed by 249

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section 3313.618 of the Revised Code by July 1, 2019, due to a student's failure to satisfy division (A)(2) of section 3313.618 251 of the Revised Code.

(9) Neither the state board nor the department of 253 education shall develop or administer an end-of-course 254 examination in the area of world history. 255

(10) Not later than March 1, 2020, the department, in 256 consultation with the chancellor and the governor's office of 257 workforce transformation, shall determine a competency score for 258 both of the Algebra I and English language arts II end-of-course 259 examinations for the purpose of graduation eligibility. 260

(C) The state board shall convene a group of national 261 experts, state experts, and local practitioners to provide 262 advice, guidance, and recommendations for the alignment of 2.63 standards and model curricula to the assessments and in the 264 design of the end-of-course examinations prescribed by this 265 section. 266

(D) Upon completion of the development of the assessment system, the state board shall adopt rules prescribing all of the following:

(1) A timeline and plan for implementation of the 270 assessment system, including a phased implementation if the 271 state board determines such a phase-in is warranted; 272

(2) The date after which a person shall meet the 273 requirements of the entire assessment system as a prerequisite 274 for a diploma of adult education under section 3313.611 of the 275 Revised Code; 276

(3) Whether and the extent to which a person may be 277 excused from an American history end-of-course examination and 278

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an American government end-of-course examination under division279(H) of section 3313.61 and division (B)(3) of section 3313.612280of the Revised Code;281

(4) The date after which a person who has fulfilled the
curriculum requirement for a diploma but has not passed one or
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more of the required assessments at the time the person
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fulfilled the curriculum requirement shall meet the requirements
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of the entire assessment system as a prerequisite for a high
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school diploma under division (B) of section 3313.614 of the
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Revised Code;

(5) The extent to which the assessment system applies to
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students enrolled in a dropout recovery and prevention program
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for purposes of division (F) of section 3313.603 and section
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3314.36 of the Revised Code.
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(E) Not later than forty-five days prior to the state 293 board's adoption of a resolution directing the department to 294 file the rules prescribed by division (D) of this section in 295 final form under section 119.04 of the Revised Code, the 296 superintendent of public instruction shall present the 297 assessment system developed under this section to the respective 298 committees of the house of representatives and senate that 299 consider education legislation. 300

(F) (1) Any person enrolled in a nonchartered nonpublic
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school or any person who has been excused from attendance at
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school for the purpose of home instruction under section 3321.04
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of the Revised Code may choose to participate in the system of
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assessments administered under divisions (B) (1) and (2) of this
section. However, no such person shall be required to
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participate in the system of assessments.

(2) The department shall adopt rules for the 308 administration and scoring of any assessments under division (F) 309 (1) of this section. 310 (G) Not later than December 31, 2014, the state board 311 shall select at least one nationally recognized job skills 312 assessment. Each school district shall administer that 313 assessment to those students who opt to take it. The state shall 314 reimburse a school district for the costs of administering that 315 assessment. The state board shall establish the minimum score a 316 student must attain on the job skills assessment in order to 317 demonstrate a student's workforce readiness and employability. 318 The administration of the job skills assessment to a student 319 under this division shall not exempt a school district from 320 administering the assessments prescribed in division (B) of this 321 section to that student. 322 Section 2.
